SHUT IN GRAIN.—It has offer been stated that this a kind of fungus, the seeds of sporules of which are so exceedingly minute; that they are taken up and ascend through the pores of sap vessels of the plant. Professor Johnston lately spoke upon this subject in a lecture before the Agricultural Chemistry Association. He observed and the smut had received the name of Uredo segethim. That these pull-balls of sporules were so missite that it would take 2800 of them to cover an inch. There was no doubt that they ascended through the rlantby examination, it could be seen where they had come up-the tubes of the stalk were filled with black matter that had come almough the vessels. affecting first the straw, and then getting into the car, where it spread itself all over. After passing through the stalk the smut fixed itself under the root of the flower, which it remilered barren, and as the grain approached perfection, the puff-balls became ripe and burst, sliowing black dust of very minute particles so minute that it took about 1,-100,000 of them to lie across a single inch. Hethen went on to speak of the manner in which, smut was propagated. It was in the Erst placesown along with the seed. Mery often it was so. Minute that thousands of the particles might attach to a single grain, and and yet not be vissible to the naked eye. Outs are misse subject to shut than other grain. Rye is never attacked by it, and wheat soldom. Grosses are sometimes attacked by it and much injured.

Certain substances have been employed for the prevention of smut. The substance used are sul bate of copper, or blue vitriel, urine, common 💸 alt, wood ashes, lime-water and some times arsenic. The application of these substances to the seed grain, destroys the black dustion the spores of the fungus, and in addition to this they make the grain. grow better. Professor Johnston mentions an instance where a large field of bels was divided into several parts, and the seed dectored in different ways—some not being doctored at all-other por-tions being dressed with guand-and others steeped

But the same remedies against its attacks are used with equal effect. - Ibid. ITEMS FOR THE SEASON. Grass Seed-One of the most successful and economical modes of securing timothy seed, and which is practiced by. farmers to great advantign to reap the tops of the grass while it is yet standing in the meadow, to be afterwards thrashell applicance, and the rest

of the grass is moved and manufactured into hav.

The seeds thus costs only the abour of cutting and

thrashing, the remainder affaiding the usual crop of hav. Mixing Manure with the hoil is of the greatest consequence; and it is especially so when applied in the latter part of summer for the wheat crop.-Wheat will not bear an abuildant supply of unmixed manure, buriets in large masses and lumps beneath the soil. When manure therefore is spread it should be harrowed at least half a dezen times well, with the surface soil, before the plough turns . it under. It thus becomes thoroughly broken, the soil is made mellow, and the whole thoroughly intermixed. So important is this operation, that one-half or even one-third the manure will sometimes be equally efficacious where this practice is

adopted. Trimming Young Trees.-It often becomes necessary at mid-summer, to frim the side branches of young trees, for the purpose of throwing the strength of the growth into an upright form. But if the side branches are cut closely, the main stem becomes too slender to support the mass of leaves 4 and branches forming the top, and the tree assumes a bending or crooked form. To obviate this difficulty, trim the branches within about half an inch of the stem, leaving short stumps, with the leaves at their base. These assist in some degree the lateral growth, of the stem, and serve to stiffen it, and which may be afterwards cut closely to the stem-An attention to this particular, will often avo much trouble in staking up crooked trees.—1b.

POULTRY HOUSES. If you wish your hens to lay in the winter, have their houses cleaned out thoroughly. Empty the nests of all filth, have them scraped inside and out, and whitewashed. Place contiguous to your hen house under roof a peck or two of lime, abushel of gravel, and a load of sand or ashes, so that they can early have access to these substances.
