WAR .- There is a brief paragraph in the late Sidney Smith's discourse on the duties of the land and America:

"A second great object which I hope will b impressed upon the mind of this royal lady is rooted horror of war-an earnest and passionate desiré to keep her people in a state of profound peace. The greatest curse which can be entailed upon mankind is a state of war. All the atrocious crimes committed in years of peace; all that is spent in peace by the secret corruptions or by the thoughtless extravagance of nations, are mere trifles compared with the gigantic evils which stalk tree, upon which a considerable number of black over the world in a state of war.
