

THE POTATO ROT-THE CAUSE, -We have examined this subject pretty thoroughly, having observed the decaying plants and the affected tubers in the field, as well as the effect and progress of the disease in the gathered crops, and we have heard and read the hundreds of opinions and theories as to its cause and remedy, and they all only go to show that there are karious predisposing causes which some consider as the leading cause.

Sarmer's Department.

We have always had the same opinion of this disease since the first agitation of the subject; and we stated that we regarded it as caused by almospheric influence. We shall now name another cause, which will place the subject in a different light, though in reality it is the same cause as the other, and that is constitutional weakness. It may appear strange to some that we regard these two causes as the same; but we will explain .-One (the former) is an agent, the other is an object acted on. Now if the incent be unfavorable and sufficiently powerful it will destroy the object on which it acts. But if the object, or kind of otato cultivated (together with favorable circumtances as to location, soil and manure,) be strong in constitution, which is nothing more than the power of life, it will resist the unfavorable influ-

We will explain further. A mun of a weak constitution is frozen in severe cold weather, while mother of a strong constitution—having stronger powers of life-escapes.
