SMUT IN WHEAT .- A gentleman who resides near the city of Washington, and engaged in agricultural pursuits, has furnished to the editors of the National Intelligencer an interesting communication on the subject of preventing smut in wheat, a portion of which we same:

I purchased last fall of one of my neighbors a

portion of my seed wheat, which I afterwards learned had been injured by that epecies of smut that is called uredo fatida, dust brand, or pepper brand : the wheat looked clean and fine, any foreign mixture. Previous to commencing the seeding of this grain, I had been seeding some of another kind, in which there was a mixture of garlic; and I nad given orders to my seed man to pass it through a brine strong enough to bear an egg, to skim off all the trash that might rise to the surface, and then remove the grain to a plank floor and dry it, by stirring it in air staked lime. When he commenced seeding the wheat that I had bought, finding it perfectly clean, and supposed that my object in steeping the other was to get clear of filth, without consulting me he began to now it, without the use of the brine and lime, and and strewed about a bushel before F discovered it. As soon as I made the discovery, I had it treated precisely as the other. When I came to harvest my wheat this season, this circumstance had passed from my memory, and I was much sur. prised to find that in one small corner of the field the smut had destroyed the wheat, while the rest !

was completely exempt from it, under pretty much the same circumstances of soil and exposure. I should have been exceedingly puzzled to have assigned a cause for this difference in the crop; hadd I not been reminded by my seedsman of the fact! of his having seeded a portion of undoctored wheat! the previous autumn; and he stated that it was on " the spot where the smut existed that he strewed it -It seems to me there can be no stronger evidence than this accidental circumstance has afforded of the benefit of brining and liming our seed wheat; and I strongly recommend the use of the process to my brother farmers.

To FATTEN POULTRY .- The following will be ound a quick and excellent food for fattening chickens. Set rice over the fire with skimmed milk; let it boil till the rice is quite swelled out. then add a teaspoonful of sugar. Feed them three times a day in comman pans, giving them only as much as will quite fill them at once. Let the pans be well washed and set in blean spring water, that no sourness may be conveyed to the fowls, as that prevents them from fattening. Give them. clean water, or the milk of rice to drink. By this method the flesh will have a clear whiteness. which no other food gives; and when it is consider ered how far a pound of rice will go, and how much time is saved by this mode, it will be found to be cheap! It is said that a portion of animal mixed with vegerable food, caused poultry to thrive rapidly but they should be confided for a vegetable diet some time before they are killed. A quantity of charcoal, broken in small pieces, and placed within reach of the poultry, increases their appe-

tite, and promotes digestion - J. M' Intosh. To PRESERVE CRAPES, &c.-Procure some tin cases of any convenient size, and put in a layer of dry sand or charcoal, and then a bunch of grapes, until the case is full; seal down the lid and make all air-tight, and bury them to any convenient depth in the ground. This plan will ries, currants, &c. These fruits, in some gardens are retarded in their time of ripening, by being covered with mets or nets, which is an excellen ? plan, and ought to be more generally adopted, as insures a succession. Grapes, peaches, and apricots, in the open air, may be kept for some time hanging on the trees, after they are ripe, by the same means, but their flavor will not be good .--Red and white currents, in the same manner, will even keep good till the end of Dacember. Ice houses have been recommended for preserving fruits list they are objectionable on account of the damp moisture which they contain. A dry, cool. and airy room, free from all atmospheric changes, is the only place where fruits can be preserved for any length of time .-- Western Furmer and Gar-

diner. IRON A REMEDY FOR BLIGHT IN PLAN TREES. -A correspondent states that he has found iron ore, or cinders of iron, placed around the roots of trees, drives away the ensect which deposits the eggs that produce the worm. Having tried this remedy in a sanuy soil, and in a still soil, and in places distant from each other, and having driven off the insect when the trees of others were very much injured or destroyed in the neighborhood. he advises all those who are troubled by these insects, to try the use of iron, rather than be under the necessity of continually topping off the limbs, which contain the worm or young insect. He thinks it probable that the iron is untavorable to the worm, which drops from the branches, and makes its wintering place at the root of the tree, and then the insect avoids an unfavorable place for its young. But whatever may be the theory. it is sufficient that fron has the desired effect .-

Gardiner's Gazette. Onchanus .- A writer in the Western Cultivator, published at Indianapolis, Ind., says, if it is worth your while to have fruit it is worth your while to have the best. It is therefore better to buy at the nurseries, than to bud your own trees. He also advises that the ground of a young apple orchard be kept in cultivation for six or eight years, and that the grass be not suffered to grow around the roots. Another writer in the same paper says, that an orchard of neglected trees may be renovated by ploughing the ground, scraping the mose from the body and limbs, and thoroughly washing the whole trunk with urine and soft soap.

Not a single production of any kind should be wasted. We have seen some farms on which the spurious vegetable alone was sufficient, if properly husbanded, to manure half the soil cultivated.
