FEEDING CATTLE .- ROOTS VS. HAY .- The ollowing extracts are from a report made to the Massachusetts Agricultural Society, by the Messra Colt, of Pittsfield, Berkshire county. We would solicit the candid attention of our agricultural friends to the facts detailed, as they seem to exhibit in a most striking light, the advantage of substituting roots for hay in feeding neat stock. writer says :-- "My stock now consists of -1000 sheep, 8 young oxen, 6 cows, a pair of horses and a single horse. I have raised this season, for the use of my stock 5.511 bushels of vegetables, and all to be grated and fed out with cut straw, the cattle constantly, the sheep one feed per'day. which seems to be a necessary fool in our long. cold winters. It keeps them in health and also in firsh. As to the respective value of the vegetable feed, the following statement will perhaps best exhibit. I have commenced feeding, and shall con-

tinue to feed-Fourteen head of horned cattle with twenty pounds of cut straw each, per day, four cents for each twenty pounds, 56 cents. Also, to eight pounds of grated roots, mix with straw, three cents, 42 cents. And now allow one hundred and fifty days for the season of feeding at ninety-eight cents, is \$147. The same stock would require 20 lbs. of hay each, per day; for 150 days they would consume 42,000 lbs., equal to 21 tons; at the moderate price of \$10 per ton, \$210, and I am sure the stock will appear far better at the opening of the spring. You will perceive that the respective value of roots for food, is six cents per bushel, while hay is at ten, and straw at four. It may be said that there is some cost in preparing food, but this is more than compensated, if properly done, by the extra quantity of manure made. Thus it appears that mixed straw and roots afford a larger amount of nutriment, in the above proportions, than the same amount of hay, and at a much less cost. It is believed that fifteen tons of roots-that is ruta baga or mangel wurtzel, is a moderate cropper acre, while the hay crop, taking the farms in general, will in all probability fall considerable short of an average of two tons.

The statements above presented, are worthy of attention on several accounts. In the first place, farmer will raise twenty tons of roots, providing the circumstances of soil and season favor the enterprise, with more ease than he can cut the same amount of hay. In the second place, the roots will enable him to appropriate, profitably, a large amount of straw and other fodder, which might otherwise be of no value, while his manure heaps will be augmented in no inconsiderable degree, both in quality and extent. The business of culivating roots for stock, with the exception of the otato, to which our soil and climate are admirably adapted, is one in which our farmers should embark with caution. - Maine Cultivator.

MANUFACTURE OF MANURE. I think I may affirm, from what I frequently vitness in the mode of making and managing manure, that many do, not sufficiently consider the. great difference between strong and weak minure, in its fructifying quality and durable effects in invigorating the land to which it is applied; and this is an important thing for every farmer well to un-derstand. If straw and hay only, with cake or corn, compose the manure that is taken to the land (and many, to my knowledge, even of those who could well afford to buy them, continue this bad practice.) comparatively it is as sour small beer to a man who has an extraordinary task to perform, and needs the aid of a powerful stimulant to accomplish it. As the man would fall short under such treatment, so does the land fail in like manner. Now if I can show that the corn given to stock upon a farm, is all returned in extra produce, besides ananifold advantages, which your sagacious readers will readily discover, surely all that have the means of entering upon this system will do so. I will take my own business for an example. I shall this winter use 100 quarters of corn upon my stock, exclusive of horses. I calculate the manufe which I shall make with which, this corn is incorporated will manure well 36 acres, and as my system of farming is three crops and a fallow, three crops will be gathered before the same land will be manured again. Assuming, then, that I get one quarter of corn more in each of the three crops by using the corn. the 36 acres in three crops return 108 quarters extra produce for the 100, expended. Of course it will be obvious to every practical man, that monures should not lie in the yard, exposed to the washing of heavy rains, but made principally un-der cover, and frequently collected into a heap, and well secured until taken to the land, and especial care taken the fermentation does not become too rapid; to prevent which anything may be mixed when it is put together, this is likely to check and cool it. I use sand when I cannot obtain anything better for that purpose, and to cover the heap over to prevent it being weakened by evaporation. A farmer does not require a philosopher or a chemist to inform him wherein the strength of minure consists; he has only to refer to his cattle stalls, his pig-sty, and dove cote; it is there seen that the manure that contains the most corn in proportion to the matter composing it, is invarialy found to be the strongest and best -A. Far-

mer in Bell's Weekly Messenger. TRANSPLANTING TREES .- The first of October is a good time for transplanting trees. If attended to at this season, when the tree is not growing, it will not receive the check that it will if transplanted in the spring after vegetation has ominenced. Some wait till the leaves have fallen, before transplanting; this may be necessary if they are to be packed in large bundles, to prevent their heating; or the leaves may be cut off,

which would be a slow process.

But when trees are not moved far, or are only little while on the way, the leaves will do no injury. After transplanting, heap the earth up around the tree, and press it down close and smooth that the water may run off. This heap of earth should be prend around the tree in the spring, that the earth, nay be concave to hold the water. It is best to transplant in fall or spring as most convenient; in either season, it should be done

early, though better late than never, as is the case KEEP TOUR LAND CLEAN .- Woods being generally indigenious, or well acclimated, are gross feeders and exhaust the soil more in proportion to their size than cultivated crups. We should, consider that farmer a wreckless manager, who would suffer strange cattle to consume the food prepared for his farm stock. A How much more is he deserving the name of an economist, who permits his crops to be roboed of their food, and consequently stinted in their growth, by thistles, daises, dock and pigweed: An idea prevails with some that weeds, by the shade they afford to the soil and to crops, prevent the exhalation of moisture in times of drought.

Recisely the reverse is the case. They exhaust the moisture of the soil in proportion to the surface their leaves and stems. Some plants it is affirmed, draw from the earth, and exhale from their superficies, more than their weight of moisture.-J. Buel.

Binns. —It is extreme had policy to countenance or permit the havor which is made of the sparrows and other small birds the innumerable insects which they destroy, should render it an object with every farnier to encourage them about their orchards and fields, as for every cherry or grain of corn they appropriate to their own use, they preserve to the famer thousands from the ravinges of the caterpiller, the cutworm, &c. Then don't permit them to be molested or shot, merely for the sport of idle and inconsiderate boys.

MANAUING, BUTTER.-The Arabs melt their butter over a slow fire, which expels all the watery particles. It will then keep without salt; and the Irish have adopted with success a similar mode for exportation to the East Indies.

DEATH FROM GUANO DUST .- The London Med ical Times describes the case of a farmer who died after a few days of extreme suffering from hemorrage, vomiting, &c. occasioned by his accidently getting a small quantity of guano dust in his throat.
