cultural Festival .- We are glad to notice that more than ordinary attention appears to have been bestowed of late upon agricultural pursuits. The usefulness of farmers as a body, is beginning to be appreciated, even by the residents of cities, who heretofore in some cases have been in the habit of speaking lightly of agriculture and its honest, healthful and pure-hearted enjoyments. Residents of great cities and large towns, are too apt to fancy because thou ands of them happen to be clustered together, that people of callings and avocacan be more absurd or erroneous, as any one may see on glancing at the Census. In this country particularly, whose extent of territory is so vast, and where there are yet millions of acres as rich as the sun ever shone upon, that have not been pressed by a spade or a plough, the business of larming must, for many years to come, constitute the occupation of the great multitude. The day will arrive, when we shall be able to raise enough surplus agricultural products to supply a large portion of the world. Our agricultural population, at present, is by far larger than any other description, and they justly exercise more influence than any other upon the character and destines of the country. We trust that this may ever he the case, for in the mass, we regard the tillers of the soil, as far purer and more patriotic than the dwellers in crowded cities. Their life is a more natural one, their pleasures are simpler, their wents fewer, their ambition moderate and chastened; while they are subject to limited temptations, comparatively speaking. The very nature of their business com pel- them to depend upon Providence, to watch with attention the changes of the season, to swar with hope and expectation the first shooting forth of grain, the bursting of the bud, the bloom of the flower, the ripening of the finit, and every other process of nature, in which the influence of the Great Master Spirit is so apparent. The farmers, generally-speaking; are more religious, more con-scentious than other portions of their fellow-creatures. Our attention has been called to the subject just now, by reading a notice of the great Agricultural Fair recently held at Utica. The Hon-Josiah Quincy, jr. delivered an address in presence of 10,000 farmers, his position, opportunities, sources of enjoyment, and of just pride and satisfaction. He contrasted the farmer's slow but cer-tain gains with the pregarious career of trade, in which nine-tenths full, or of the crowded professions. He urged that the farmer should not be a mere digger and driver, but a social, moral, religrous and intellectual being; that his familiarity with Nature invites this, and his opportunities for moral improvement rightly appreciated, are surpassed by none other. He painted the futility of the office seeker's aspirations, and urged the farmer to shun them and find enjoyment for his loisure and scope for his ambition in his home and his pursuits. BEANS AMONG CORS .- There is, I think, great economy in planting dorn and beans alternately in rows. Some have advocated the practice of planting corn and polutoes together, but I think this mode liable to several objections. Same have practiced planting shill of beans near the southerly side of each hill of corn, and some practice planting corn and beans in the same hill Trogether. Now I think the better way is to plant the beans as nearly in the centre between the rows of corn as may be-this will give both the corn and the

leans a better chanco.

I have this year a field of an acre or more of corn. The suggestion was made to me, when planting the same, that a hill of beans might be lanted near each hill of corn without injuring the crop. I however thought it most advisable to put the beans at the greatest possible distance from the corn, and I planted then in the centre of the rows. In order to try the experiment fairy, upon about one-third of the field I planted no beans. This field of corn is now tall, of luxuriant growth, of an excellent color, and well cared. The beans are certainly the best I ever saw, and the corn is equally as good where the beans are growing as where there, are mone. I think that the crop of beans will prove a clear gain.—
The best of farmers have more less of weeds between the rows of corn at this time of the year. and certainly the roots of the bea plant are not so strong feeders as those of weeds. I think the small white bean is preferable, being the most pal-atable and the most highly prized in the market. Bean vines are an excellent winter food for sheep. Bean meal will make excellent mutton.

KINDNESS BETTER THAN FORCE .-- If you want our horse or your servant to work well, you must endeavor to make them happy; happiness increases the strength and energies of both, and unnerthem weak in a particular point, do not press and narrass the weakness, but show it indulgence. Do, not urge either of them to do more than they are well able, as the more they are compelled to do to-day the less they will do to-morrow. When you find your horse begin to slacken his speed, do not recklessly compel him to maintain it, but think how you yourself would like to be thus urged on beyond your strength. Do not worry your horse by repeated whio strokes, as every blow robs the animal of some of its strength, and continual plows rob it also of the motives to exertion by the violence of the strokes on the skin, and also affect the muscles underneath on which the motions depend. If you have two horses working together. and one horse is slower or weaker than the other, do not force it to do as much as the other, but rather stacken the speed, if evon it is by keeping the other horse back; and never use bearing reins; they are useless to the driver, vexatious to the horse, and the cause of many falls, but above all, be not too fond of showing them that you are their mester, and they your slaves; they know it well enough to their sorrow, without this trouble.

IMPROVING FARMS .- The investigations of the Farmer's Club have shown that by deep ploughing and light manuring, most of the lands of Virginia, which have been thought to be worn out, may be reclaimed. In consequence of the hints of the Club, many farms which could have been bought a few years since for \$5 to \$10 per acre,. are now worth from \$40 to \$100. A State Agri-cultural Society has been formed. The improvement effected by the Club in the agriculture of the country is estimated at one per cent; and as the aggregate agricultural products of the country are estimated at \$700,000,000, the Institute is hought to have benefited the country in agriculture alone \$7,000,000 .- N. Y. Courier & Enqui-
