The quantity sent to market is increasing weekly, and the demand for coal is quite brisk both for consumptio on the line and for the city, and also for shipment; there having been no less than 3 brigs and 20 schooners and sloops, loading coal on Wednesday last, at Richmond for Eastern ports.

The shipments would be increased to 20,000 tons per week, if our operators could obtain the necessary number of cars to send it to market; but from some cause there appears to be a scarcity, and it is charged by number of our operators, that there is a system of favoritism practised by the Company with regard to cars, which, if true, ought to to be discontinued at once.


