of such weak spurs as are imature and imperfect; but no fear should be indulged that the vine, if in a good soil, is not capable of maturing its fruit on any extent of branches it may naturally produce, as among the most productive vines found in Carolina, there are many instances where a single vine covers an acre. Summer pruning is only called for in locations where the vines are confined in too narrow limits, and then but very partially, as any considera ble pruning will cause the fruit to turn black and fail off and even cutting off the leaves: will prevent the maturity of the fruit, as they are the conductors of the essential nutriment from the atmosphere to the fruit and to the whole plant .--The foreign varieties, being natives of a much milder climate, require considerable pruning, and but a moderate proportion of the vigorous shoots should be allowed to remain, it being necessary in. this case to substitute skill and artificial culture in order to remedy the inappropriateness of climate. The most delicate foreign vatieties do not succeed in this latitude except under glass, but in that way
