The quantity sent by Rail Road is gradually increase ing, and reaches 21,561 04 tons this week. A great scarcity of hands has retarded it a little at the upper end, notwithstanding the exertions of Mr. B. Morris, the Engineer, who has been indefatigable in pushing it forward.
