

REABING CALVES .- Various practices prevail in different places, in nursing calves intended to be kept for stock. Far in the interior, where keeping and milk are cheap, some farmers suffer calves to run in the pasture with their mothers, and suck during the summer. Some let them suck for three months, and then take them off and

let them pick for themselves. Some farmers take them away from the mother immediately, and feed them on milk which they ire taught to drink from a pail, or trough. We have known some to fatten their calves for the butcher by hand feeding. But labor must be cheap and milk dear to make this practice profitable.

There can be no doubt that milk sucked from the cow, is betterfood for the younging than any that can be furnished. The calf draws it gradually; it physics him just enough, in ordinary cases; and it is just warm enough for his stomach. When calves drink inilk from a pail they swallow too rapidly and the system is disordered. It is physiced oo much or not enough; it is not so agreeable to nature, a departure from whose laws must be prac-

our Farmers are preparing to 'plaster' their Corn, we would beg again to invite their attention to the new preparation used for that purpose, noticed in the Telegraph two years ago. We allude to com-mon Sait, which has been found to be a certain remedy against the attacks of grubs, worms, and every other depredator upon the young Corn plant. Let it be mixed with plaster, in the proportion of one quart of salt to three of plaster, and applied at the same time and in the same manner as plaster usually is applied, being about a table-spoon full to each full. Care should be taken, however, not to throw the mixture upon the plants, as the salt may prove injurious to them; but put it around

them and to them. Those who have tried this preparation, have derived striking advantages from its use, not only in the complete protection which it afforded the crop against grubs, worms, &c., but on account of the strong fertilizing qualities of the salt. We should like too see it generally adopted by our Farmers, and we should like, also, to be informed of the re-

SMALL FARMS IS. The pericarp of this seed is singularly hard and tenacious, and if committed to the soil without previous preparation, it frequently fails, as the extremely indurate nature of the integument resists the moisture, and thus insure the loss of vitality to the seed. After immersion, pour off the water, and introduce a sufficiency of tine loam, ashes, or plaster of Paris to absorb the moisture, and facilitate the operation of sowing. Some prefer letting the seed remain in the loam till germination takes place. Immediate sowing, however; we consider

as much more judicious, especially when the seed is known to be good.—Maine Cultivator. BUTTER.-It is found that a good dry cellar is a better place for making butter than a springhouse. At least so says the Farmers' Library. The reason is, the dampness occasioned by the water is more injurious to the milk and butter, than is compensated by the coolness it occasions. A dry as well as a cool atmosphere, is needed for this purpose; and it is better to dispense with a part of the coolness than with all the dryness. Cellar butter, it is said, will keep sweet and good much longer than spring-house butter, and retain its fine flavor and color to the last. In some places, as

Cunious Fact .- A farmer in Vermout last season was behind all his neighbors in cutting the grass in his meadows. At night some waggish boys went into one of his meadows and cut down all the grass in it. At the time of digging the potatoes they were found rotten except where the boys had cut off the tops, and there they were all found good and sound. This would seem to show that the disease begins in the tops, and it suggests as a means of saving a crop the cutting of the tops so soon as the tops begin to die .- Morning News.
