To the Honorable the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in

Congress assembled : . 2

The Petition of the subscribers, citizens of Schuylkill county, Pennsylvania, engaged in the Coal Trade and various occupations dependent upon the prosperity of the same, RESPECTFULLY REPRESENTS :

That the Coal Trade from 1838 to 1842 was in a most deplorable condition-the operators were reduced to as state of Bankruptcy-- the miners and laborers were out of employment, or working for a bare pittance which was paid almost entirely in traffic-the Rail Roads leading to the Landings were gradually sinking into decay and ruin, without the means of repairing or relaying them-despondency and desolation characterized every branch of the trade, and that too at a period (1839 & 40) when the duty on Foreign Coal was higher than 30 per cent ad valorem, the rate proposed to be charged in the Bill reported to your honorable bodies by the Committee of Ways and Means.

Your memorialists attributed that prostration to the reduction of the duty on the foreign article, and in their memorials presented to your honorable bodies in 1842, they pledged themselves to Congress and the public, that if the duty on Foreign Coal was increased to \$2 per ton, and a consequent reduction in the price in our Atlantic cities did not follow within a period of five years from the imposition of said duty, they would not ask a continuance of any duty. A specific duty of \$1 75 per ton was imposed by Congress, and the following were the average prices of Coal in the Philadelphia, New York and Boston markets, in the years designated, copied from the Books of regular dealers in those cities, which confirms the predictions of your memorialists to a much greater extent than they anticipated: ; •

From 1837 to 1842 a large portion of the Miners and I aborers were out of employment, and those Laborers who succeeded in getting work, received only from \$3 50 to \$4 per week, and Miners received from 5 to \$6, which in many instances was all paid in traffic. Now all those who choose to work are employed, and laborers receive from 5 to 86, and miners from 8 to \$10 per week, nearly all of which, and in some instances the whole sum, is paid in money, showing an increase of wages from 20 to 40 per cent. since 1842.

Your memorialists attribute the present flourishing state of the trade, which contrasts so advantageously with former years, to the salutary effects of the Tariff of 1842, which inspired confidence, and stimulated heavy investments in the trade, increasing labor-saving machinery in mining, and greatly extending and cheapening the facilities of transportation, not only in our own region, but to the Atlantic markets-they therefore deprecate any alteration in the present duty on Coal, believing that it would prove ruinous to the trade, destructive in its effects on the price of labor, and would confer no advantages on the consumer.

Your memorialists would call your attention to the fact, that the proximity of the Pictou and Nova Scotia coal mines to the New England States, would give those regions a decided advantage, if the duty should be reduced, over the American operator in Pennsylvania, as the price of freight from those places to Boston is seldom. more than the price of freight from Philadelphia to Boston. while coal can be put on board at Pictou and Nova Scotia from \$1 50 to \$1 75 per ton less than it can be put on board at Philadelphia.

Your memorialists, although directly connected with the Coal Trade, are aware that the various productive; and manufacturing interests are so intimately connected, that the reduction of the duty below the standard of Protection on any, would seriously affect the interests of all; they therefore respectfully suggest to your honorable bodies to cease legislating on the subject, and let the present Tariff alone. It has worked well so far, and the people are satisfied with it. And they will ever pray, &c.
