THE NATIONAL FAIR .- The approaching exnibition of American manufactures continues to at ract attention; and we are glad to see that extenive preparations are going on to make the display the greatest that has ever been witnessed in this ountry. Arrangements have been made in the principal eastern cities, to carry goods to Washngton at the least possible expense, and commits tees of responsible men have been chosen to super-

intend the forwarding of the goods. The new building for the exhibition is fast spproaching completion. From the Western Continent' of Baltimore, we gether that it is divided into four divisions, all under one roof, which are to be known as the Main Avenue, Central Half, where the main building and wings unite, and the east and west wings. The Main Avenue is 240 feet, by 60 feet wide, with a shed 20 feet wide, on each side, presenting a front of 100 feet. The Central Hall is 60 feet square, and each wing 60 by 100 feet. The ceiling, 25 feet high, is supported by pillars, and from the pillars to the wall, oneach side, along the Main Avenue, are placed the tables for the display of manufactured goods, proenting a surface of over 7000 superficial feet .--A Steam Engine will be set up in the east wings; drive such machinery as may be exhibited. The whole edifice will be securely constructed and thoroughly weather proof; so that all articles will be perfectly safe from injury.

It is preposed to close the Fair, with a grand National Ball. A correspondent of the National intelligencer says: - The floor of the building neasures 30,000 square feet, and will accommo date 150 colillions, giving 200 square feet to each three; 600 couples, or 1200 persons may be seen dancing on the same floor at the same time-a thing never surpassed in this, or pethaps any other

ountry." The Baltimore American suggests the propriety of a reduction of fare on the leading northern outes, in order that as many persons as possible may be induced to visit the Fair. We have no loubt that the suggestion will be acted upon by the rail road and stenm boat companies from Boss ion to Washington. We would ask whether the Reading Rail Road Company ought not to furne ish extra and cheap facilities for persons in this region who might wish to visit the Fair.
