BEAUTIES OF FREE TRADE .- The following note written to the Editor of the U.S. Gazette graphically illustrates the peculiar charms and advantages of this system.

Mr: Chandler-Just two months since I shipped to Liverpool from this port some 2800 bushels red and white wheat, worth, at that time 95 to 100 cents per bushel, of 60 pounds. The freight was at 9d. per bushel, and it was admitted at the low:st rate of duty, say 4s, per quarter, equal to 93 bushels, of 60 pounds. I have just received ac-count of its sale, and it netts 76 cents per bushel, of 60 pounds. The consiguess advise that the duty is likely to coon reach 10 shillings per quarter; at this, the nett proceeds would have been 62 cents per bashel.
