Tue WAREHOUSE LAW .- We stated last week that the effect of the Warshouse Bill would be to convert our Custom House Stores into depositories of European Goods. The following article from the U.S. Gazette of Thursday shows, that the process has already commenced:

"This new law to provide storehouses for foreign goods at a low rent, is now in operation, and the cargo of the ship Susquehanna from Liverpool, in in a great degree, being stored in accordance with the provisiens of the Warehouse Bill. It will rest snugly in the storehouse until December next, when it will come forth under the new and depreciated duty. It is in this manner that the Government will derive its increased revenue for some
