

The truth is the Briti-h policy was been dictafed by no admirations for the dostripes of Free Trade. The Corn Laws have been modified for the purpose of enabling her manufactures to work at cheaper rates, in order that they may more advantageously comp to with their rivals in Ameri-

ca, and Europe, who are rapidly driving them from the markets of the world. Selfishness is at the bottom of her policy now as it has always been. She reduced the duty on breadstuffs for the same reason that she reduced the duty upon raw cotton, not for the benefit of the American producer, but for the benefit of her own manufacturers. She protects the landed interest less in order that she may give more efficient protection to her manuactures—the great source of her wealth and ower.
