

Roor Cultung .- It has been remarked that the introduction of Root Culture was the means of effecting as great a revolution in British hubbindry, as that of the steam engine and spinning jedny produced in British manufactures. There can be no question, we think, in the minds of those conversant with the history of English agriculture, that rost culture has been a most valuable source of fertility and wealth to that mation. With the English husbandman, roots constitute at present, by far the most important material for making beef and mutton as well as for supplying the means of positive en-richment to the soil. The system, however, which s there persued varies essentially, in many important respects, from that adopted in this country. This discrepancy, however, it should be remarked, is the esult of causes purely local. Prof. Johnson, recethe south of the court of the Agricultural Chemical Association of Religiburghing test the bllowing account of a farm belonging to Mr. Atcanson, of Drammofe, near Mysselburg, about ten intlessouth of that city. The farm consists of about 800 acres, and lies upon the coal measures, the sal produced by the decomposition of which is generally considered very poor. Another method is to deposite hem in a vessel, and pour over their common lye. This process as well as that of mixing them with arth, as above directed, is an economical one, ountless, especially for those who apply but limit ed quantities, and who are averse to entering on any system likely, to involve expense, - Maine Cultivator

PROLIFIC QUALITIES OF GRAIN .- Wheat, barley, oats and tye, are the grains of temperate climates. The first, for its cultivation requires a 'mild and rather elevated temperature, with a good soil, while the other grains are more hardy, and are calculated to endure the inclemency of a colder region and more ungenial soils. Fortunately for mon, all these grains grow readily in most of the climates and soils of the inhabited earth; but in every soil they call forth his utmost care and ingenuity in order that their may be an uninterrupted succession of crops. Hence has arisen, the important art of Agriculture. Under proper treatment the prolific qualities of the cerealia are truly astonishing Sir Kenelm Digby assures us that! 1660, there was, in the possession of the fathers of the Christian doctrine at Paris a plant of harley, which they at that time kept as a cuiforty nine stalks springing from one root of grain, and on which they counted above, eighteen thouand grains or seculatof barley. It is recorded in the Philosophical Transactions, that Mr. Miller of Cambuldge, sowed on the 2d of June, a few grains of common red wheat, one of the plants from which had been tille I so much, that on ht8 the .f. August, he was enabled to divide it into eighteen plants, all of which were placed seperately in the ground. In the course of September and Octoher so many of these plants had multiplied theirstalks, that the number of plants was sixty seven. With the first growth of the spring the tillering again went forward, so that, at the end of Murch and the beginning of April, a further division was made, and the number of plants now: amounted to five hundred. These five hundred plants proved extremely vigorous, much more so than wheat under ordinary culture, so that the number of ears submitted to the sickle was twenty-one thousand, or more than forty to each of the divided plants; in some instances, there were one bundred ears upon one plant. The cars were no markably fine, some being six or seven inches long, and containing from sixty to seventy grains. The wheat when soperated from the straw, weight ed forty-seein pounds, the estimated number of grains being 576 840. Such an engineering crease is not, of course, attainable on any greatscale, but the experiment is of the as showing the vast power of increase with which the most, Valuable of vegetables is endowed.
