Farmer's Department.

HARVESTING INDIAN CORN .- We extract from the Complete Farmer and Rural Economist, the following valuable remarks on the harvesting of Indian corn. They are of a nature quite too practical to be disregarded, and we therefore commend them to the candid attention and onsideration of our patrons :-In harvesting the crop, one of the three modes is adopted, viz :- 1. The corn is cut at the sur-

face of the ground when the grain has become glazed or hard upon the outside, put it immediate. ly into stacks, and when sufficiently dried, the corn and stalks are separated, and both secured. 2. The tops are taken off when the corn has become glazed, and the grain permitted to remain till 'Oc. tober or November upon the butts. Or, 3. Both corn and stalks are left standing till the gram has fully ripened and the latter become dry, when both are secured. There are other modes, such as leaving the butts or entire stalks in the field after the grain is gathered; but these are so wasteful and slovenly as not to merit consideration. The stalks, blades, and tops of corn, if well secured are an excellent fodder for neat cattle. If cut, or cut and steamed, so that they can be readily masticated, they are superior to hay. Besides their fertilizing properties as a manure, are greatly augmented by, being fed out in the cattle yard and imbibing the urine and liquids which always there abound, and which are lost to the farm in ordinary yards, without abundance of dry litter to take them up. By. more labor, and does not increase the quantity or In addition to the above Regular Lines, a number of quality of the grain. The third mode requires the same labor as the first, may improve the quality of the gram, but must inevitably deteriorate the quality of the fodder. The corn cannot be husked too promptly after it is gathered from the field. If permitted to heat, the value of the grain is materially impaired.

It has often been stated that great advantage was derived from selecting seed corn from stalks which have borne two or more ears. The Hampshire Gazette; published at Northamptoff, Massachusetts, mentions a farmer who thas selected his seed corn in this way for three years past, and the result has exceeded his expectation. He states that it is not uncommon to find in his corn field this season (1831) stalks with three, four, five, and sometimes six ears, and three of them fair, full grown, and fit for seed, and that too-in hills containing four or five stalks.' . He says :- I think my crop has been increased several bushels this year by the experiment. I would suggest a mode of selecting seed to those who do not cut up the corn by the roots. When they are picking corn, and find a stalk with two or more ears, let them tie the husks together, and the ears will be easily

Apple Trees Bearing Alternate Years .-Those who have any thing to do with orchards, or who have paid any attention to apple trees, know very well that some trees will not bear a full 'crop to the exhaustion of the trees during the bearing years. In those years the tree hangs very full, in-deed all its powers are put forth to ripen such a heavy crop; and this expense of sap or other matter so exhausts the system that it requires a year of rest to bring up its energies. This may or may not be the true cause, at any rate the fact is wellknown; and many who have good varieties of apples, have regretted that they could not change the state of things in regard to particular trees, and have a crop every year. Mr. Longfellow, of Winthrop, well known as a successful orchardist, informs us that he had succeeded in changing this habit, in a variety of Juneating which he had in his orchard, and which bore alternately. His manner of doing it is this:

Having other trees which bore alternately. but not in the same years with the Juneatings, he was convinced that grafting the two together, the habit of one would counterfact that of the other, and a 'nullification' of them be produced. Accordingly on a bearing year of the Juncatings, he took scions from them and engrafted them into stock, which would that year be harren. The result in the cases which he has tried justifies the conclusion
