retreated. The Nauvoo leader, Anderson, and his son wers killed and two others.

mortally. Another liattle is expected. -Great suffering existing at Nauvoo, in consequence of the scarcity of provisions and ammunition.

The St. Louis Reveille, contains the followings The Mormon force is estimated at from five hun-Ired to six hundred, but our informant states that they have very little annunition, and are almost entirely destitute of provisions. He thinks that their destitution of provisions and ammunition must yet render them an easy conquest sithough many of them, men and women, swear they will . die on the soil before they will be driven away-His description of the scene of distress and alarm, to be witnessed in the city is truly appaling. Women and children frantically running in the streets with their husbands in the field, and they withous

home or refuge from the storm. In many cases the balls fired by the Anties are gathered up by the women and carried to the Mor-mon camp to be used again. Such of the women and children as can, have crossed the river to Montrose. Many of the new citizens have also gone oyer. Those who remain, it is thought, will sell heir lives dearly. It is stated by some of the

Mormon leaders, that they have a mine laid in the streets, by which they hope to effect great destruction of the Autics, if they gain an entrance into the city.
