The Coal Trade for 1846,

The supply this week is 32,420 16 tons, being an increase of 4000 tons over last week. The dealers in New York, who were holding back, under the impression that the Canal would be completed in time to pro duce a reduction in freight on the Rail Road, are now convinced that no Coal business will be done on the Canal this year, coupled with the impression that there will consequently be a short supply of Red Ash Coal in that market, are sending in their orders for that kind of Caal, and the supply for the balance of the season from this region will only be limited by the number of Cars the Rail Road Company can furnish. It is the impression of some, that the stagnation of business, which has cut off a supply of about 50,000 tons from this Region, (and the increase in the supply this year so farbeing only about 170,000 tons, last year it wes 350,000) may cause a scarcity in some of the markets that cunnot be reached in Winter. The period of Canal Navigation on the Lehigh, Lackawana and Susquehanna, is rapidly drawing to a close, and although we can mine almost any quantity in this region, the facilities of the Rail Road will be limited to the present supply of cars, which were scarce this week; and these facilities will be further curtailed by the cold and frosty mornings which will soon set in.

Vessels are plenty at Richmond, and prices remain without much variation. There is a slight rise to New
