



WINTER CULTURE OF THE POTATO.—EXTRA-

WINTER CULTURY OF THE POTATO -EXTRA-ORDINARY EXPERIMENT. - We learn that a successful attempt to raise potatoes from seed sown in the beginning of September has been made in Prussia. A correspondent of the Leipsic Gazette says that "in the beginning of September, by way of experiment, he laid out a little bed in his garden; and planted half with white and half with red countries covering them only slightly with leasth potatoes, covering them only slightly with earth.

The potatoes throve more rapidly and stronger than in the spring season." Another writer says,

"in spite of the severe winter, I have on the lat of November, covered up potatoes (having a stalk only a foot high) and they have grown admirably, and are perfectly formed." The writer states that "the specimen furnished him of these winter pota-toes were indeed of so remarkable a kind, that it

furnishes a strong recommendation in favor of in this connection we would suggest to our winter culture." farmers the propriety of making this experiment immediately, especially as the rot has cut off the prospect of our ordinary supply. If the experi-ment succeeds as above represented, we should like to see whether by this means the rayages of the rot may not be counteracted. We are inclined to think it may, especially if (some think)

"the injury is the result of an insect. How To PRESERVE BUTTER .- Dr. Anderson's famous recipe for preserving butter, has been often published, but it may not be amiks to give it again, as things of the greatest utility are a long time in making their way to general adoption. Best-common salt, two parts; saltpetre, que part; sugar, one part beat them up together, so that they may be completely blended. To every pound or sixteen ounces of butter, add one opnce of the omposition. Mix it well with the mass and close the Pennsylvania Half, where he will constantly keep it up for use. Butter prepared in this manner will keep for years, and cannot be distinguished from that recently salted. It should, however, be remarked; that butter thus cured, dies not taste well, till it has stood a fortnight or three weeks. Dr. Anderson remarks that he has found by experience, that the above mentioned composition not only preserves the butter more effectually from any taint of rancidity. but makes it also look better. taste sweeter, richer and more marrowy than if it

had been cured with common salt alone. The Cottage Gardener, says, Dr. Harrison, of Edinburg, prefers dandelion coffe to that of Meca, and many persons all over the continent prefer a mixture of succory coffee alone. Dig up the roots of the dandelion, wash them well, but do not scrape them, dry them; cut them into the size of peas, and then roast them in an earthen pot, or coffe roaster of any kind .- The great secret of good coffee is to have it fresh burnt and ground.

HEAVES IN Honses .- A correspondent says, after trying various modes, he has found the following the best treatment for horses having the heaves, viz — To feed no hay, but plenty of bright, whole [or uncut] straw, with all the oats they would cat, [the latter soaked in cold water three or four hours,] with a pint of oil-meal [flax seed] daily. On this feed they have worked well, and were troubled little with the disease .- Albany Cultivator.

In respect to stull feeding neat cattle, it may be observed that good hay is undoubtedly the best for fattening cattle, when judiciously combined with cabhages, carrots, parsnips, turnips, or similar suc-culent plants, though hay will rarely be found capable of fattening animals, without the aid of other food, when Enishing off for the markel.

Cinen.-Here is a receipt worth to farmers the price of our paper for a year: Take a pint of pulverized charcoal and put in a bag—then put it in a barrel of new cider, and the cider will never ferment, never contain any intoxicating quality, and become more palatable the longer it is

kept. Peach trees are more liable to escape frosts when planted on the north or west sides of buildings, the shade from the south sun preventing the too earlstarting of the young fruit buds, and their conse-

quent injury by subsequent frosts. It is said that barrels in which salt has been packed are a certain preventive against insects for
