



Farmers' Department.

From the Farmer's Cabinet. CURING: Mins.—To the Editor:—As the season for slaughtering our cattle and hogs, and putting them in the cellar for family use, is at hand, the mode of curing beef, pork, and hams, is important to every housekeeper. I take it for granted every one knows that in curing pork, the main point is to put in a great abundance of good salt. There need be no fear of applying the and. There need be no fear of applying too much. If not required to curing the meat, it will much. If not required to curing the meat, it will remain in the cask, and is as good as ever to be applied again. In curing beef, salt should be used more sparingly. Six lbs. of fine salt, four ounces of saltpetre, one and a quarter lbs. of brown sugar, make a good proportion of ingredients for 100 lbs. of beef. In twenty four hours a pickle that will bear an egg, end wise, should be applied.

Drying beës should remain in the pickle about ten days. To cure hams thoroughly, so as to have them sufficiently salt to keep, and yet not too salt, and to give them 'the real Jersey flavor, is a more delicate operation, and requires a nice hand. The following recipe is a good one, and may be relied on for making a first rate hain. To 80, the of hams, take four ounces of hams. ibs. of hams, take four ounces of brown sugar, three ounces of saltpetre, and one pint of fine salt, pulverize and mix them thoroughly; rub the hams well all over, particularly on the desh side, and lay them on boards for 36 or 48 hours, then pack them in casks, adding two quarts of fine salt to every 80 lbs. of hams. In fifteen or eighteen days, they may be hung up to smoke. Gloucerter co., N. J.

.WINTER IS COMING. - The Indian Summer is pleasant in October—but the cold nights which we have lately experienced, admonish us that winter will soon be upon us and the following short chapter of advice from the Buffalo Express, is n.t. only seasonacle, but to the point :

chilling winds—the frosty nights—the pattering rain—the mud, cold fingers, and sundry other un-mistakable signs, that winter is at hand, and wa should prepare to give him a gearm reception. Brush up your old stores—look up the pipes—ex-amine your flues—and order a wood pile. Put on thick boots to keep your feet dry—flannels to keep the cold out-and never leave home without an umbrella. Winter is coming with his hail, sleet, and snow. Call for the glazier have every pane made whole, or the hole will let in the cold.-Caulk up every crevice and cranny, for old December blows terribly cold, and is ever in search of some forgotten seam through which to puff his fristy breath. He'll nip the budding plants that have been reared with so much tender care, to break the gloom of winter by their foliage and flowers, unless he is kept without the casement.

Prepare for winter before it comes upon you, and then the mastery is surely yours?

THE GENTLEMAN FARMER.-It is worse than idle for any man to expect to better his position in a pecuniary point of view by turning gentleman farmer. If a person have a fortune already, ne may lay out pleasure grounds, fence in parks, make experiments in crops, try crosses in breeds of cattle, and set out trees for shade and scenery, and thus gratify his taste, and possibly make some discovery for others to benefit by: out in his own case he will lose money—probably he expects it.
What would any one think of a gentleman warrior, or a gentleman poet?—that is, of a man that should hire all his fighting done, or all his verses made? If success only crowns individual, personal exertion in all other matters, how is it that in this alone, in the primitive occupation of minkind, men expect it, without putting their own hand to the plough, and grinding themselves for the labor! It is a common remark among husbandmen, that he who works with his hands, gets double the amount of work out of them compared with him who only gives his orders, and waits until they are accomplished. The general must lead his troops to victory—he must endanger his own life he would infuss bravers into the hearts of his soldiers, and this principle is not inapplicable to the 'bose of the farm.'

SALT FOR STOCK .- Cattle of all descriptions, while confined to the barn in winter, should be liberally supplied with salt. It not only induces a healthful appetite, but operates benefic powerful and efficacious preventive against certain liseases to which domestic animals, restricted for a long time to dry food, and in confined situations are inevitably exposed.

A little attention to this important subject, on the part of our farmers, would be the means of preventing much useless trouble and expense, as vell as a source of almost incalculable comfort and advantage to the stock. Sheep, the condition of which, through their long and wearying confinement to the fold in our horthern climate, is often one of great suffering and wretche Iness, are found to be no less benefitted by its free administration, than the ox and cow. > FOIMPROVE THE QUARTITY AND QUALITY OF PEARS .- During the winter lay bare the roots of the tree, by digging for a space of 2 feet each way from the tree; fill the hole half full of blacksmith's cinders or old iron, and in the spring fill up the hole with new earth or compost; the cinders or iron being exposed to the weather, oxides during the winter and conveys by means of the roots to the tree and fruit; the quality of the fruit will be found much improved, and many trees now worthless, may have their health and usefulness restored.

> TURNIPS FOR MILCH Cows.-Farmers and dairy people sometimes object to turnips as a feed for cows in consequence of the bad or astringent flavor they are said to impart to the milk. This is unquestionably a reasonable complaint, as we have purselves frequently detected it not only in the milk of animals so fed, but very distinctly in the butter made from the milk. But this evil admits of easy remedy. By feeding the animals liberally with salt, and allowing them to partake of the turnips as long as practicable before milking, no bad consequences will result from the use of turnips, cabbages or other roots.

Some assert that the disagreeable flavor complained of may be neutralized or overcome simply by sprinkling a small quantity of salt in the pane Bensalem, Oct. 93, 1846.
