OPERATION OF PLASTER. There seems to be a great diversity of opinion as to the reason why plaster or gypsum fails to benefit such a large portion of our Atlantic coast, Long Island, and New Jersey, particularly. Mr. Ruffin of Virginia, in a work on Calcareous Manures, advances a theory based on his experience as a practical farmer, that appears to me to be more satisfactory than any other I have seen, and I am somewhat surprised that his theory has never found its way into our northern agricultural journals.

I made a visit to Virginia last winter, preparatory to removing there, and while there I made particular inquiries in relation to the extensive marl formation which underlays nearly the whole eastern portion of the state, below the falls of the rivers, and its effects upon the soil. I found it to be extensively and profitably used, and producing important and permanent changes in the soil; so much so, that clover cannot be made to grow at all until marl, or its equivalent, lime, is applied.— The marl contains from 30 to 80 per cent of lime, which is the principal if not the only fertilizer contained in its composition. I inquired how plaster succeeded on clover, and the almost invariable reply was, it does no good whatever until the land is marled or limed. I inquired the reason of this, and was referred to Mr. Ruffin's work on Calcargous Manures. I there found what appeared to me to be a very satisfactory reason, and I will give you a brief abstract. He says that the most of the soils of eastern Virginia were found, upon analysis, to contain but a slight trace of calcareous matter, and with the exception of the land along the margins of the rivers, which he terms neutral soils, he calls them all acid soils; and the presence of sorrel on the land he considers an indication of acid soils. Sorrel grows abundantly on all land which he terms acid .-Oxalic acid is the acid of sorrel. Now, sowing on plaster in the usual quantity, that being a sulphate of lime, the oxalic acid has a strong chemical affinity for the lime; the lime leaves its combination with the sulphur, and combines with the oxalic acid; and forms an oxalate of lime, and sets the sulphur free to combine with iron or any other ingredient it can find. Apply a good dressing of marl or lime, and it combines with the acid

idence; its soil produces sorrel plemifully. Lime has been used but little, and in many cases with no perceptible effect, and plaster, with a few iso-lated exceptions, has totally failed. I hope that some of your Long Island and other readers who are similarly situated, will make experiment, and see if like causes will produce like effects. The experiment need cost them but little money or

While on a recent visit to Dutchess County, a friend intermed me that the prevailing opinion in that county was, that plaster applied to one field, injured an unplastered field adjoining, as much as it benefitted the one it was applied to, and that ome went so far as to say that if a piece of woodland was left amidst cleared land, and that cleared land plastered the timber commenced decaying and dying. He told me of an instance that went strongly to prove the truth of that opinion. An old farmer had a very fine meadow, in a creek liottom. He commenced plastering his upland ly-sing around, and adjoining it. His meadow, which had never before failed to produce luxurious crops of grass, began to fail, and confinued to do so until it was hatdly worth mowing. He then com-menced plastering it at once restored. Now what can be the cause of that ! Perhaps our chemists are the most proper persons to judge; but I can give my own opinions as they do not cost much. The idea at once occurred to me that it might be caused by the absorption of ammonia' from the surrounding atnosphere, by the plaster, (as ammonia and sulphysic acid have a strong affiinity for each other,) that the unplastered land was deprived of its due there from that source, as plants are said to derive large share of their ammonia from the atmos-Perhaps some of your able correspon can enlighten us as to the cause of it.

G P. Lewis. For Curing Hams.—We copy from "the Cultivator" the following article, which is partic-

ularly interesting at this season. The receipe must be worthy of trial, as we see by the remarks preceding it, that it is a repub-, lication at the request of several farmers who have ried it, and know it to be good. For every one hundred pounds of meat, take five pints of good molasses, (or five pounds brown sugar) five ounces saltpetre, and eight pounds rock salt-add three gallons of water, and boil the ingredients over a gentle fire, skimping off the froth and scum as it arises. Continue the boiling till the salt, &c. is dissolved. Have the hams nicely cut and trimmed, packed in casks with the shank end down and the pickle will thus strike in better. When the pickle prepared as above is sufficiently cool, pour it over the hams. They must lie in pickle from two to six weeks, according to the size of the pieces, or the state of the weather. Beef or mutton hams or tongues intep-

ded for smoking and drying, may be cured according to this mode, and will be found excellent. There are other modes of pickling hams which are more esteemed in various countries. "In that excellent and agreeable work entitled "Farming for Ladies," we find the followin; directions for preparing the celebrated Hambro' Pickle, which is said to be equally applicable to beef, pork, tongues, &c. To each gallon of water, put one pound and a half common salt, a quarter of a pound of course brown sugar, an ounce of saltpetre, boiled and to be carefully scummed. After standing in a proper vessel until quite cold the meat may be immersed, and will be fit in ten! days, and improve for months; but it must be arefully pressed down by means of a cover, and a clean heavy stone. The pickle must be watched, and when any scum begins to rise, the meat must be taken out and the liquor reboiled, and scummed and closed as before: at the same time half a pound more salt must be added: but no raw, salt is to be applied at any time. The meatis to be returned when the pickle is quite cold say after ten or twelve hours. Tongues will require a month and are improved by the addition of an ounce of bay salt added to the above. One clove of garlic, half an ounce of Allspice, and as much whole pepper, boiled with the ingredients much improved it.
