Uncle Sam. THE CITE OF READING .- We gro indchted to the Reading Gazette for some statistics in reference to the city of Reading, which show the progress and present state of prosperity of that place.
The present population is 13.044, divided as follows: White males, 6.495; white females, 6.250; colored males, 146; colored females, 153.

In 1840 the population of Reading was 8,410. Increare in seven years, 4,634 There are 2,398 families in Reading, and only 2, 138 liouses, showing that the upmber of families exceeds the number of houses by 260. The public schools are 26, and the scholars 2,141, private seminaries 10, with an average of 250 scholars. There are 14 Churches, besides other public buildings; 8 news-papers, 5. English and 3. German, 7 published weekly, and one twice a week. The number of persons employed about the railroad workshops is 583. Besides these there are 90 engineers and the same number of fremen, and 12 laborers upon the road.

The Reading Iron and Nailworks, belonging to Messrs. Seyfert & Co, employ 160 hands; consume 1,200 tons of anthracite coal annually, and are making 6 tons of nails and spikes and 15 tons of merchant iron per day. The Henry Clay Fin-nace built by Eckert & Brother, employe 126 men-aud 20 horses; it consumes 12,000 tons of anthracite coal, 6 000 tons limestone, and 9,000 tons iron ore, and produces about 3.000 tons pig metal per annum. The Franklin Foundry and Machine Shops, owned by Adam Johnson, comprise an iron foundry, machine shop, two blacksmith shops and a car shop, and give employment to 120 hands. M. A. & B. Bertolette's Rolling Mill employs 80 hands when in full operation, The Reading Foundry and Machine Shop of Messrs A. B. Darling & Co., employs about 70 hands. Adams & Doughtons's Foundry employs from 8 to 12 hands. Waid's Agricultural implement Manufactory employs about 12 workmen. The Sieam Forge of Messrs Sabbaton & Co. has three hammers and gives employment to about 21 hands.
