MANURES. - The English Gardener's Almanac for 1814, says that in 1837, £254,000 worth of bones were imported into England, and the quantity is annually increasing. Of woolen rags, from 1836 to 1842, over 7.059 tons, or 1.191 tons annually, were imported, and used chiefly by hop growers, but excellent as a general manure. In England, with a territory but little larger than the State of New York, there are 10 millions of cattle and 44 millions of sheep, kept advantageously. With the manure imported and secured at home by these means, and a system of careful culture, there are raised annually, when favored with ordinary seasons, 262 million bushels of grain. Cullivator. FATAL TO SWINE .- Sollpetre is as fatal to . wine as arsanic to man. Our foreman last year salted song swine with refuse salt which had been taken from a beef barrel and stored away; within twelve hours two out of three which ate of it died, and the third was much injured. As farmers at this season are emptying their meat barrels, instead of preserving the refuse salt for the future, they had better bury it in the compost heap. Our beef was but slightly saltpetred, and but a very little could possibly have been taken by the swine.—N. H. Post.
