LATER FROM THE ARMY. BY TELEGRAPH.

For the Miners' Journal only. Twelve hours in advance of the mail.

FRIDAY EVENING. 6 o'clock, We learn by Telegraphic despatch from Fredericksburg. Va., that the steamer Falmouth had arrived at New Orleans from Vera Cruz, bringing the following impor tant intelligence from the army. up to the 18th olt.

Gen. Scott had refused all the offers made on the part of Mexico for peace, and that he had taken up his line of march for the Capitol.

Santa Anna was still officiating as President of the Republic Great consternation was caused at the Capitol by the refusal of the offers of peace-but it was doubtful whether any serious opposition would be made to Gen. Scott's entry into the city:

It was stated that Gen. Vega, a prisoner on parole of honor, was heading a Guerrilla party to harrass the Americans. If so, and he is taken, the rules of war will require him to be shot.
