Later from Mexico--Gon. Scott still Advancing. Vera Cruz dates to the 8th, Tampico to the 10th, and Brazos to the 11th, have been received at New Orleans by the arrival of the steamshid Galveston. The New Orleans papers do not state that the overtures of peace had been rejected by the Mexican Congress. A council of war had been held by Gen. Scott at Puebla on the 24th, to discuss the question whether the army should advance on the capital or not. A General whose name is not given expressed the opinion that it would be imprudent to advance with less than 20,-000 men. Gen Worth differed from these views, Gen. Scott and the rest of the officers agreed with Gen. Worih's views, and it was forthwith resolved to take up the line of march for the Capital on the 28th, but would halt at Rio Frio a few days, to give time to the Mexican Government to determine its answer to the proposition for negotiation of peace. The American force is estimated

at 8.500 men. A Skirmish at Tobasco!--Twelve Marines and Sailors Killed! Commander Bigelow, at the head of 300 Marines and Sailors; attacked some six hundred Mexicans, whom he found encamped near Tabasco, and after a severa engagement of several hours, succeeded in utterly routing them, with a loss of but twelve, killed and wounded. We learn that Dr. J. Howard Smith (brother of Horace Smith Esq. of this Borough,) of the war ship Spilfire, bors an active part in this engagement, and sustained
