

DRAINING .- It is almost meetless to observe

that the importance of draining is not properly ap-preciated by our farmers, or that few have prac-

ticed it systematically. A writer on this subject very justly remarks :- "Our best lands are de-nominated cold and wet soils, because the water

is suffered to soak into the ground, and there re-

SALT FOR THE QUINCE TREE.-In making a drain from my kitchen, it so happened that it emptied its contents?near the roots of one of the quince treesmentioned. The tree, the season after, came into begring, and as a good deal of brine had been emptied into this drain, I suppo-sed the salt might have produced a fruitful state. Acting on this supposition, I commenced apply-ing salt early in the spring to the other; quites

trees at the rate of three quarts per annum to the surface of the ground under each tree, the trucks of which were then about as large as a man's wrist. They came into hearing the following season, and have given me constant and good crops every year since. PRESERVING TOMATOES .-- A corresiondent of the Cultivator, in a late nu mates that preserving tomatoes is a humbug. My wife has been in the habit for several years of putting up tomatues for winter use, and has kept themgood for a year and a half. She says they must be stewed a lung time-five or six hours at least.

They are then well seasoned with salt and pepper; buttled and corked tight and, kept cool. Ours are usually set in the earth in the cellar bottom. My family are very fond of it, either cold or warmed, with beef staak or roast beef.

IMPROVED CANDLE WICKS .- An improved candle may be made by sleeping cotton wicks in lime water, in which a considerable quantitp of saltpetre (nitre) has been dissolved. By this means is obtained a pure flame and a superior light; a more perfect combustion is ensured; snuffing is rendered nearly as superfluous as in wax lights; and the candles thus made do not run nor waste. The wicks should be thoroughly dry before they are covered with tallow, otherwine they will not burn with a uniform and clear light.

T It is thought to be a preventive to the unhealthy influence of cucumbers to cut the slices very thin, and drop each one into cold water as you cut it. A few minutes in the water takes out a large portion of the slimy matter, so injurious to health. They should be eaten with high season-- | . · · · · iog.
