Concerning the removal of the scat of justice of the county of Schuytkill, from Grwigsburg to the borough of Pottsville.

Sec. 1. Be it effected by the Servate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the summitted the state of the same, That it shall and may be lawful for the qualified voters who have resided in Schuytkill county for stilents six calendar months immediately preceding the met, the first who have resided in Schuytkill county for stilents six calendar months immediately preceding the met, the removal is mediately preceding the met general election, to wore at such election upon the question of the removal of their seat of justice from Orwigsburg to the borough of Pottsville. In the county of Schuytkill, in the manner following to wit: those in favor of a removal shall vote a written or printed ticket labelled "seat of justice," and containing the words "To Pottsville;" and those opposed to a removal shall vote a written or printed ticket, labelled as aforestaid, and chailating the words "To Towigsburg," the stidutickets to be deposited in a box which shall be browled for than purpose at each and every of the ejection polls of said county; and the returns of said election shall be midde in the same manner, by the return of asid election shall be midde in the same manner, by the return judges, as in the case of the election of members of assembly; and if, on the meeting of the return of said election shall be midde in the same manner, by the return judges, as in the case of full force and effect; but if it shall appear that a majority of the votes have been given in tayor of Pottsville, then the following sections of this act shall be of full force and effect; but if it shall appear, that a majority of the voters of said county of Schuykill, qualified as aforesaid, voting on said question of removat, shall, decide in the manner provided in the first section, of this sait, in fagor of the removal of the seat of justice, in

Sec. 3. It shall be lawful for the citizens of Pottsville to obtain subscriptions from any person or persons willing to sub-cribe any money or materials for the erection of such court house and public office; as are provided for in the record section of this act; and in default of the payment of the same to the county Commissioners are hereby empowered to cause, suit to be brought in the name of said county, to enforce the feaviery of the same; and when collected, to be applied towards defraying the expenses of such buildings.

Sec. 4. That so soon as the public buildings are completed, according to the provisions of this act, she county commissioners aforesaid, shall file a report of the same in the court of common pleas of Schuylkill county; and the said court, upon examination thereof, being satisfied that said buildings are fully completed according to the true intent and meaning of this act, and a record thereof being made, by endorsement, on said-report, the commissioners and sheriff of said county shall thereupon cause the prisoners, if any there shall be confined in the new biocation in the borough of Potisylle, in the county of schuylkill, shall be kept and they deposited in the new biocation in the borough of server of the said county, sha

Sec. 7. If any judge or inspector of the election authorized to be held by virtue of this act, shall knowingly or wilfully reject the vote of a citizen qualified to vote on the question of the removal of the seat of justice in-said county, in accordance with the first section of this act, or shall receive the vote of a person not qualified to vote as afore-sid, on said question, he or they so offending, upon conviction thereof before the proper court of quarter sessions of said county, shell orfeit and pay, for the use of said county, for every such offence, a sum not less than three hundred dollars or more than six hundred dollars, at the discretion of the court, and shall undergo an imprisonment in the jail of more than two years.

Sec. 8. If any judge, inspector, or clerk of the dection authorized to be held by virtue of this act, shall witfully miscount, or shall falsely and fraudulently add up and return the votes received upon the question aforesaid, or shall keep a false tally paper, or shall be guilty of any fraud in the discharge of his duties, every person so offending, upon conviction thereof in the proper court of quarter sessions of said county, shall be subject to the same fine and penalty as are imposed upon delipagent judges or inspectors by the general election laws of this commonwealth.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the judges and inspectors conducting the election authorized to be held by virtue of this act, to cause the letter R to be legibly and distinctly set opposite the name of every citizen who shall vote on, the question of removal of the scatt of justice as aforesaid, on the tally paper on which his name shall be registered, and any, wiful omission so to do, shall be deemed a fraud, and shall be pandshed as such, in accordance with the provisions of the eighth section of this act. such, in accordance with the provisions and clerk conducting the election authorized to be held by virtue of this act, to take (in addition to the outlier or affirmation he is now required by law to take) an eath or affirmation that he will honestly and faithfully comply, in every respect, with the provisions and requirements of this act.

SEC. 12. It shall be the dult of the sheriff of the said county of Schuylkill to cause this act to be published in at least three newspapers published in gaid county, for at least once in every week for sixty days, immediately preceding the next general election; and shall, on the dity of the clection, cause at least two printed copies, one of which shall be in the German language, of said act to be posted, in handbill form, in the most public places nearest the election poll in every election district in said county, and the reasonable expenses of such publication shall begind by the said county of Schuylkill by orders drawn in the usual way.

Sec. 13. That William T. Sanders, Augustus Holmes, Joseph F. Taylor, James B.
