September Sessions, 1847. The Grand Jury innquiring for the body of the County of Schuylkill, respectfully report:
That they have had before them fifty-four bills of indictment, forty-four of which have been found true, and ten have been femored. The Jurors deplore the great increase of criminal business brought before them, and believe that a much greater portion of which originated and is the rivalit of the many Beer-houses; the Grand Jurors would respectfully ask the Honorable Court to impress upon the Constables the necessity of having all Beer, houses closed on the Subbath. They have also under the direction of the Court, visited the public buildings, and County prison, and would carnestly recommend to the County Commissioners the necessity of additional security to the Vaults of the Public Offices, by putting additional Iron Shutters on the windows and doors of the Vaults; the present shutters are ignicequate to the safety of the Public Records, the loss of which by fire would be irreparable; the expense of the improvement is considered to tabling forms. The Grand Jury innquiring for the body of the County of the Public Records, the loss of which by fire would be irreparable; the expense of the improvement is considered too triling for a moments delay. The Prison they found clean and comfortable—they found the improvements directed by the last Grand, Jury, and also the improvements made by the County Commissioners in the Stair way, and the subdivision of the large room, adds much to the safety of the Sheriif and the security and comfort of the prisoners, of which the Jurors approve. The Grand Jury, also call the attention of the proper authorities, to the crossings of the Philadelphia, Reading and Pottevillo Rail Road at Schugikhi Haven and at Mount Carbon; they would recommend that the Company should bave hampe put up and lethed for the safety of persons crossing said road, and that the Engines should give more timely notice of their approach; that much d-tention is caused to the travelling community by large trains of Cars being stopped at the crossings before any circumstances. any circumstances.




