ecause not penetrated by insects) wero uniform. ly the most thriving, and seemingly the most proluctive; many of these were upwards of sixty years old, their trunks completely covered with noles, while the branches were broad, luxuriant, and loaded with fruit. Of decayed trees, more than three-fourths were untouched by the woodpecker. Several intelligent tarmers with whom I have conversed, candidly acknowledge the truth of these observations, and with justice look upon these birds as beneficial; but the most common opinion is that they bore the trees to suck the sap, and so destroy the vegetation; though the pipe and other resinous trees, on the juices of which it is not pretended they feed are often found equally perforated. Were the sap of the tree their object, the sacharine juice of the birch, the sugar

maple, and several others would be more inviting, because more sweet and nourishing, than that of either the pear or apple tree; but I have not ob-served one mark on the former, for ten thousand that may be seen on the latter. Besides, the early part of spring is the season when the san flows most abundantly; whereas it is only during the months of September, October, and November, that woodpeckers are seen indefatigably engaged in orchards, probing every crack and crevice, boring through the bark, and what is worth remarking, chiefly on the south and west sides of the tree, for the eggs and larvæ deposited there by the countless swarms of summer insects. These, if suffered to remain, would prey upon the very

vitals, if I may so express it, of the tree, and in the second summer give birth to myriads equally destructive ...

But as ridges are not mado of 968 yards in length, and as horses cannot] draw a plough that distance without being affect. ed in their wind, and as allowances must be made for turning the ends of the ridges, as well as affording rest to the horse; that speed will have to be considerably increased to do that quantity of-

work in the time. By experiment it has been found that one hour, mineteen minutes, out of eight hours, are lost hy turning, while ploughing an acre of ridges of 274 yands in length, with an' eight-inch forrowslice. Hence, in ploughing an acre of ridges of 250 yards in length, which is the length of the ridge I recommend as the best for horses in draught. when speaking of enclosures, in ten hours with a ten-inch furrow-slice, the time lost by turning is one hous twenty-two minutes. d presume the experiment alluded to does not include the necessary stoppages for the rest of horses, but which should be included; for however easy the length


