PHILADELPHIA-Dec. 10, 1847, 6 o'clock, P. M. There is nothing here in the way of news of sufficient importance to transmit. The markets have not apparently been affected one way or the other by the Brittannia's news. Flour still remains quiet at \$6 50 a \$6 624 for superior brands; wheat is worth 140 a 142 cts., in demand; corn meal is firm at \$3 25, in bbls; new Southern corn is held at 53 a 55 cts., for good white and vellows nothing dising in oats.

A Grand Failure! - We had entered into full arrangements for receiving the President's Message on Tuesday last, by Magnetic Telegraph, but the government agent who started from Baltimore with a copy of the document for the Philedelphia Telegraph Office, by some management or mismanagement of his own, lost it on the way -how or tehere we have not learned, but cannot restrain our suspicions! The Telegraph-wires between the two Cities had been severed, and ommunications were thus cut off!

Upon learning the above facts, we immeditely dispatched an order for a sufficient number of printed copies to serve our carriers—but instead of having received them by Express, as we directed. so as to be in advance of the mail, they were thrown into the passenger cars, and remained in store at the railfoad depot for two days before we obtained them!

It will thus be seen that we have been peculiarly unfortunate in our express movements-nevertheless we have the pleasure of enclosing copies of the Message, this morning, to our mail-subscribers.

The citizens of New Orleans were perfectly happy at the 'old man's' arrival and Thursday, the 2nd inst., was appointed for his reception by the authorities of the city.

The Whig adds 1- No man's presence will be greeted with greater delight than Mr. Clay's by his host of devoted friends. They long once more for the opportunity of doing homage to his powerful intellect, and for seeing statesmanship. He comes in the highest of all characters,-that of the private citizen and he will receive at the hands of the people such a welcome as will make his heart warm for joy on revisiting the scenes of his former triumphs. We hall the advent of the venerable statesman, and hope that the city will at once take measures to make him her guest.

NINETY-TWO LIVES LOST

Loss of the Packet Ship Stephen Whitney. LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

ARRIVAL OF THE BRITTANIA. The Steamship Brittania strived at Boston on the 8th instant, with two weeks later news from Europe. The dates from Liverpool are to the 9th November.
The British Parliament was convened yesterday but no business was transacted beyond the mere eremony of opening which was done by Royal

Commission.

The French loan of 250,000,000 of france has been adjudged to M. D. Rothschild at 751, which was the maximum received. The adjudication had little or no effect upon the English market. An announcement reached us on Monday afternoon that a formidable conspiracy was discovered in Paris, which had the effect of seriously depressing the English funds for a short time. The committee of the Stock Exchange had commenced an investigation into the circumstances connected with the report, but it could only be traced to Folkstone, from which it was received by the electric telegraph.

Hostilities have at length commenced in Switz-

rland, between the Federalists and the Sunderabund. The forces of the former, under Gen. Defour, have invested the fortified city of Feydeux, occupied by the army of the latter. Some skirmishing had taken place in which the troops of the Sundersbund were worsted. Count Brisson, French Ambassador at the court of the two Sicilies, committed spicide on the 2nd in t, and a short time previously, Count Mortin, also French Ambassador at the

Torin. attempted to murder both his children and cut his throat, while laboring under a fit of A Convention has been tentered between the Pope, the Grand Duke of Tuscany and Luces, and the King of Sardinia for the formation of Tariff based upon the principle of the German Commercial League. The measure has been siled throughout Europe with the greatest possible satisfaction.

The state of Ireland is truly frightful. A system to resist is every where manifested, and landlouis are daily falling before the vengeance of the

Although the price of money is still high, and nsolvencies are rife, the fury of the panic has been stayed; the prestige of brighter and happier days can be distinguished amidet the darkness of the past and the gloom of the present. Trade is evidently making vigorous struggles to rise, despite the forebodings of disheartened, and in many instances, dishonest theories, and the still great discouragements of perfected confidence and ex-

inguished accommodations.
The French mail Steamer Union will not leave Havre until the 24th inst; in consequence of the injuries which her machinery suffered upon the last Voyage from New York. The Serah Bands will resume her trips on the 22nd January. The Bremen steamers will continue to run fortnightly during the winter, until the new vessels shall ready, when the spring will commence with a
