

TO be charged the following rates of toll to be charged on their works during the year 1848.

ANTHRACITE COAL,

To be charged per ton of 2240 bis., the weight to be as certained by such means as may be adopted to secure accuracy, and five per cent. allowance to be made herefrom for loss by wastage. The toll to be computed rom Mogan Carbon for all coal coming from above that wint, and to be charged proportionately for all distances arried on the Canal:

For the months of March, April, and May, youry cents per on.

For the months of June and July, yifty CENTS PER TON.

or the months of August, September, October, November, and Docember, altry-five cents pen row.

MISCELLANEOUS ARTICLES

To be charged per ton of 2240 pounds.

THEN CLASS.

Merchandize generally, such as dry goods, earthenware, salt, from in pigs, bars, or any sings of manufacture beyond the ore, nails, flour, grain, and all other articles not specifically enumerated in classes first and second.

Two cents per ton per noile for the first twenty miles carried, and three-locarits of a cent per ton per mile for any additional distance carried beyond twenty miles.

Note.—I til cases where one or morelocks are passed, and the distance carried shall be less than two miles, the charge for toll shall be for two miles according to the class to which the articles carried may belong.

And in all classes where the foregoing rates shall exceed \$\overline{\text{d}}\$ cents per ton on the ascertained tonnage of the vessel for any lock passed below Reading, or 4 cents per ton, above Reading, the toll shall be charged at these mentioned rates on all articles.

Boats intended to one run regularly in the trade on the line of the Canal will be licensed to pass the whole or any part of the line empty by the payment of ten dollars. The licenses will be issued by any collector, and will continue in force during the year 1918, provided the boat so licensed shall pay a sum in toils equal to ten dollars permonth.

Boats not so licensed will be charged five cents per licenses.

so becaused shall pay a sum in toils equal to ten dollars per, month.

Boats not so licensed will be charged five cents per mile, unless they carry cargo-which has paid five dollars to toils.

Any boat not the licensed as aforesaid, and running upon a single level of the works, shall pay for each lock they may at any time pass, four cents per ton on the ascertained tounase thereof above Reading, and six and a quarter cents per toir below Reading.

The Company will turnish cars, boats, and landings, and all fied every facility for transporting coal to market at the most reasonable, rates, and they are prepared to make contracts with operators and others engaged in the coaltrade, and with those who will build and run loasts on the Canal, on theral terms.
