As a great diversity of opinion exists amon the Colliers, as to the amount of Broken coal that ought to be made under this new arrangement. I would respectfully suggest that the quantity made, should not be less than ten per cent of the quantity manufactured. After a pretty extensive intercourse with the venders and dealers in coal, in New York and the East, I am fully satisfied that ten tuns in the nundred, can be sold of the broken size, and as it is deeply important to us that we should not break our coal into a smaller sise, then the market requires, I hope the interests of those concerned will induce them to adopt an arrangement, in the adjustment of their Rollers. which will enable them to take advantage of the above suggestions.

AN ACT

For the protection of Mirers, Mechanics, and Laborer. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the Commonwealth House of Representatives, or the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in all assignments of property whether, real or personal, which shall hereafter be made by any person or persons, or chartered company, engaged in the mining of cost, either as owners of the soil, or having a lease of a coal mine or mines, or by any pors in or persons, owning or leasing machine shops or foundries, to trustees or assignees on account of insbility, at the time of assignment, to pay his or their debts, the wages of the miners, mechanics and laborers employed by such person or persons or chartered company, in and about such business aforessid, shall be first preferred and psid by such trustees or assignees before any other creditor or creditors of the assignor, except claimfor rent which shall be first paid; the surplus to be distributed according to existing laws: Promided That the claims of the miners, mechanics and laborers thus preferred shall not exceed fity

SECTION 2. That in all cases of the death of any person or persons engaged in the operations aforesaid, the wages of such miners, mechanicand laborers employed as aforesaid, not exceeding fitty dollars shall rank and be paid immediately after rents, as they are now payable by existing

SECTION 3. In all cases of executions, landlords' warrants, attachments and writs of a similar nature, hereafter to be issued against any person or persons or chartered company engaged in the operations before mentioned, it shall be Iswful for uch miners, laborers and mechanics, to give no such miners, belovers and mechanics, to give notice of their claim or claims and the amounts thereof to the officer executing either of such weigh at any time before the actual sale of property levied on. and such officers shall pay to such miners, mechanics or leburers out of the proceeds of sale, the amount each is justly entitled to receive, not exceeding fifty dollars in like manner as rents are now pavelile in such cases: Provided, however, That such claims for wages shall not be preferred and paid before the claims for rent and the provisone of this act shall extend only to those counties

in this commonwealth in which coal is mined. THE LEIN LAW.
