POSTSCRIPT.

Prospect for the Supply of Gold -A correspondent of the London Times estimates the present year's supply at forty millions, and the question of the standard value of gold will soon be presented by competent writers. The entire product of the American mines, according o Baron Humboldt, for the century following the discovery of America, say from 1500 to 1600, was £138,000,000 sterling, or \$690,000,000, and for the century ending 1700, £1,\$00,000,000.

According to the same eminent writer, the average supply of the precious metals from America was as follows: From 1493 to 1500, \$250,000; from 1500 to 1550, \$3,000.000; from 1550 to 1600, \$11,-000,000; from 1600 to 1700, \$15,000. 000; from 1700 to 1750, \$22,500,500; from 1750 to 1803, \$35,300,000.

Whereas, at this moment, we have a supply from the Ural and Siberla mines, sources unknown in the last century.) an annual supply of \$20,000,000; and from American mines, excluding Callfornia, \$20,000,000. The supply from the California mines, it is estimated by many, will be a like sum.


