 THE PROTECTIVE POLICY—THE PEOPLE DEMAND ITS RESTORATION.

**CASS AND AUSTRIA.**  
 The Senate of the United States has occupied considerable time in discussing the Resolutions, introduced by Gen. Cass, suspending diplomatic intercourse with Austria, in consequence of its barbarous treatment of the Hungarians. The old General, ambitious and desirous of making a speech for "effect" more than anything else, no doubt thought that, after reflecting upon the noble stand taken by CLAY on the Southern American Republics, as well as Greece, years ago, he should thought the same amount of glory would be returned to him in this matter. The suspension of Diplomatic intercourse, is a matter of great consequence, and while it would have little effect upon Austria, it might prove a heavy detriment to our country. If it has heretofore been necessary for a Representative there, it is necessary now. Our Commerce would suffer serious injury, while our citizens, traveling or sojourning in that country, in case of difficulty, would have none to whom to flee for protection. A more serious Austria case? Think you the country, whose acts of barbarity, equal those of Carthage—whose mode of warfare is a disgrace to the 19th Century—whose *Hajducs* are the embodiment of all that constitutes a monster—a man whose acts would place him by the side of Caligula—think you that that country would care for the suspension of Diplomatic intercourse?

That the speech of Mr. Cass was made for Bonaparte, will appear evident from the fact that he endeavored to enlist CLAY in behalf of his resolutions; and when he found CLAY could not be made to advocate the measure, he changed his tone with conservatism. But this charge was refuted by CLAY in a manner that Cass will do well to recollect. The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore *American*, alluding to the subject, says: "In this episode CLAY is pronounced as too far behind the march of civilization to feel for oppressed and down-trodden Hungary as keenly as the Locofoco party, while he had his doubts no doubt in his own breast that the greater portion of the sympathy of that party is here humberg, gotten up for the occasion to tell upon our German citizens—were the points of their sympathy cultivated exclusively for Hungarian Bonapartes, Gen. Cass and all others who are true patriots would readily acknowledge that all had been done which this Government could properly do in favor of the independence of this brave but ill-fated people. Why, if philanthropy alone be the motivating M.O. of his philanthropic movement, should he have endeavored to make a political platform of a subject which should be placed upon the broad-ground of Christian sympathy and humanity? And what is this of Mr. Cass and his party? So far as its constituents a principle in the creed of the Republican party it is simply an ardent desire to adhere to the glorious institutions of our Union which have been handed down to us by our ancestors instead of a disposition to adopt every wild and fanatical scheme which may be started in order to propagate those who "are studios of change and fond of novelty." What ever good is found in progressivism will always be advocated by that party. It is truly "progressive, not aggressive, not vindictive, not a meddling, and it is this principle alone which can healthfully develop and safely maintain the genius and perfection of our institutions and guide our growing Republic to its true and ultimate destiny—the entire emancipation of the nation from the earth from the shackles of despotism.

This is the heaviest importation of foreign Coal in any year since the foundation of our Government. The average price of the Coal as imported on board at the shipping ports, was \$27 07 per ton—and the average duty at 30 per cent *ad valorem*, in the British Tariff Bill of 1846, was 61 cents per ton. The duty on Coal in the Tariff of 1842, was \$1 75 per ton. Under that Bill our Republic was prosperous—under the Bill of 1846, every branch of business is prostrated.
