



CUTTING & CURING CORNFORDER. A writer in the Maine Farmer thus gives his experience and mode of cutting and cur-

ing cornfodder: In the first place it is very important to cut the corn before the first hard frost? I cut the corn up near the ground, and lay as many rows together as will make the piles large. enough for a good sized bundle; then let it lie until it becomes some wilted or until it is. convenient for us to bind it. I then bind and stand two bundles together, until the whole is done. In this way the fodder and corn will dry much faster than when more are put together, will stand the wind and rain as well, and will be ready to be put into the barn in half the time required when put up in larger shocks. Que man will cut, bind, and stand up one acre a day, and not work

bard at that. When cured enough to get in, I take a hayrack and hay-forks-load the corn as carefulas I can, without breaking open the bundles; and when in the barn I set them up as

compactly as I can. In this way, I harvested twenty acres of plowed land corn in 1849. Some of this corn was in the barn more than two months before being husked, without the least damage to com or fodder fed last spring some corn-fodder, mized with straw in the fall of 1848; it was as bright and good as the growth of 1849, and the stock-cattle, sheep and colts-eat it all. I think an acre of fodder saved in this way worth as much as a ton of hay. My cows give more milk when fed on corn fodder than when fed on hay. I use a corn-sheller and give the cobs to my cattle. sheep and colts. I do not think that from twelve hundred bushels of ears of corn, there will be twenty-five bushels of cobs left, not

eaten by the stock. CLOVER OR TIMOTHY SEED. Mr. B. M. Ellis, of Muncy, Pa., furnishes the following as his mode of preparing and sowing these seeds, which he has found to

be the best he has ever tried:

six quarts to the acre of which "missed." I sowed nine acres in the "old way," viz: the clean dry seed; six quarts to the acre. On the whole field there may be two acres of clover, not moré. I sowed nine bushels of plaster on this field; not any on the other. An experienced gentleman told me of this way, and that be had seldom if ever missed having plenty of clover, and thick enough

CHURNING Housekeepers ought to know that churning can be done with any good churn in five to fifteen minutes in winter as well as summer, by having the temperature of the cream right—say sixty to sixty-two degrees.

The temperature of an ordinary sitting or living room, in winter, to be comfortable, is sixty-five to sixty-eight degrees, and a closet opening into such a room, would be the best place to keep the pot in winter. In the summer the cream can be readily reduced to the right temperature, by break-

ing up clean ice and putting it into the chura. A thermometer, which is necessary to regulate these matters, cost but one dollar; and such an investment every farmer ought to make, who has churning to do, and thus save labor and time, which is money, and make this much dreaded part of the labor of farmers' wives and daughters much pleasanter and easier -[Ohio Cult.]
