



buil must not be kept up too long, or too briskly till after the saponification is completed and the whole of the lye intimately combined with the fatty particles; after this, the evaporation of the water may be pushed pretty quickly, by a steady boil, till copiouvapors cease to rise. This criterion is observed when the paste has become too still to be stirred freely. The soap should have a dazzling snowy whiteness, provided the laid has been well refined, by being previously triturated in a mortar, melted by steam heat and then strained. The lard soap so prepared is semi-solid, and preserves always the same appearance. If the paste is not sufficiently boiled, however, it will show the circuinstance very soon; for in a few days the soap will become gluey and stringy, like a tenacious mass of bird lime. This defect may not only be easily avoided, but easily reme-
