The quantity sent by Rail Road this week is 22, -700 15 tons, showing an increase of 3,822 tons ove last week.

The demand for Coal continues good, and th mild weather enables our Collieries to supply the demand. The shipments have, however, been cu off from Richmond by the closing of the Delaware, and Coal has advanced to \$8 per ton, by retail, in New York City. The business will open with a clean market in the Spring, and from present indications there will a prosperous business in the Coal Trade this year.

A word of caution to our Coal Operators. Do not sell any large quantities in advance-confine your sales to one or two thousand tons, or quantities that can be delivered in short periods. All the Coal that can be mined and sent to market, the present year, will be required; and with all the exer-

tions of the trade it will be difficult to supply the demand the present year. The trade is in a peculiar state. As soon as the Iron trade was prostrated after the passage of the Tariff of 1846, all improvements for extending the Coal trade in the principal Coal Regions were stopped, and those few that did progress, were greatly retarded. In this County all new improvements were checked in 1848, and about one-fourth of our population scattered abroad-hundreds of houses in our towns were empty, and some villages, that ha sprung up under the Tariff of 1842, were nearly de populated, leaving the ability of the Region to fur aish more Coal than was required by the market. In Schuylkill County this ability has not been in creased beyond what it was three years ago, and the extraordinary demand caused last year, from various causes, which we have heretofore explained, worked up all the regions to nearly, if not quite, their full capacity. The Lehigh and Lackawana regions are clogged up for the want of facilities to transport an in creased supply to the Atlantic markets, and in Schuyl kill County, where we will possess ample facilities for transportation, it is extremely doubtful whether the Collieries will produce the quantity of Coat the market will require. This is the present state of the trade, brought about principally by the enactment o the Tariff of 1846, which checked improvements and so seriously effected the Iron trade of the M Fritz & T Foster amount of note disand so seriously effected the Iron trade of the country; which is the great consumer of Coal. It is true that many improvements are in progress to increase its production, but these improvements will not be available to any extent before next year, and their progress must necessarily draw off a num-ber of hands from the production of Coal in those Wörks already in operation, which, together with the number of men that have left for California du-ring the last few months, may probably create a scarcity of miners in the different regions. Under all these circumstances we cantion our The provided set of the set of th it unusually low rates, for the last three years, and the dealers abroad have had a fair, and in many instances, a profitable business, while the producers have been completely prostrated, (they having A Albright for [83] produced Coal without any profit, and, in many instances, at a loss for the last three years,) and who were only saved from being engulphed in one general ruin and hopeless bankrupicy, by a great public calamity, the destructive freshets of 1850, it is but justice that they should have the benefit of at least the largest portion of the advance in the price of Coal that must necessarily take place this year, which advance ought to be amicably shared between the Operators, Miners and Ilaborers of the region. This can be accomplished by pursuing a conciliatory course, and by strictly adhering to the principles of justice and right on both sides. Whether the Coal Operators or the Landholders ought to make the improvements, is a question which is now exciting considerable attention in this Region, and the impression is rapidly gaining ground that the Improvements ought, and must, hereafter, be made by the Land-owners. We alluded to this subject a few weeks ago, and intended continuing our remarks, but having received the following communication on the subject from one who is not engaged in the Coal trade, we substi-

ANNALS OF EUROPE IN 1851.

The London Morning Chronicle, in its review of the year 1851, gives the following sad, but true, picture of the present condi-

tion of Europe: "The chapter which it (1851) forms in the annals of Europe is a melancholy one: for the cause of freedom and intelligence has

nothing to show but one disastrous retreat. In Italy, and especially in Rome and Naples, ic presents but a counterpart of the Prophet's roll. Lamentations, and mourning, and woe' these meet us alike in Roman dungeons, in Sicilian prisons, in stricken Venice, in menaced Sardinia. From the shackles of Berlin we turn with dismay to the bayonets nonweatth, dated of Vienna ; and everywhere it is as if the page of history were written backwards .-And last and foulest treason of all, France -the France of civilization and intelligence -has consented to the most insolent and complete subversion of all constitutional rights, extending to the annihilation of the

press, and even of liberty of speech, which the world has witnessed since the invention of printing. In this downfall of the hopes of all liberal minds, it is well for us that our own land exhibits so many signs of hope.--It is well that we can be self-reliant ; for we shall have ample occasion for trusting to our own energies and internal developement, and to them alone. It we shall not have to encounter a hostile Continental league, we must, in prudence, calculate upon a serious and prolonged repression of free principles

and institutions in nearly all the States of Europe."
