

Very likely-there was sarcely a single manufacturing establishmen,t in all the South, at that time, and the Southern people, both Whigs and Locos, were almost unanimously in favor of Free Trade, in the absence of any personal interest in the matter; and it s not at all strange that their Representatives in Congress should have voted in accordance with the prevalent opinion of their constituents.

But the dominant interests of North Carolina and of the Southern States generally have materially changed within the last ten years. They are gradually turning their attention from the growing of Cotton and Rice and Sugar to other branches of business .-The importance of Internal Improvements s now viewed in a different light from what it then was, and manufactures are springing up in various parts of the country. Besides, the operation of a Protective Tariff, in contrast with the present Free Trade policy, has since been seen and is now fully appreciated. The experiment has changed the opinions of many leading men, on the subject, and they now proclaim their decided preference for the former. Mr. STANLY, of North Caroina, who will be here to-day, will corroborate this statement and show the extent of this change of Southern sentiment and explain the reason of it. And, we hope, he will, also, tell us how NORTH CAROLI-NA, THROUGH HIS VOTE, SAVED THE TARIFF OF '42.
