





Recollect that General Butler never served with General Scorr in any of the battles of Mexico; and that the first time those Generals came in contact, the former was, by order of President Polk, to supersede the Conqueror of Mexico in his command. Recollect that General Wool never served with General Scorn in a single battle of that war, and was never with the army. Recollect that General Lane did not join General Scorr until months after the capture of the City of Mexico. Recollect that General Pierce did not join General Scott's army until after the ege of Vera Cruz and the battle of Cerro Gordo. Recollect that he commanded his brigade at the battle of Contreras only on the afternoon of the 19th, and that when the decisive contest on that field came on, on the morning of the 20th, he was "unable to keep his saddle or to walk, in consequence of a severe injury from the fall of his horse the day before," and the command of his brigade devolved upon Colonel Ransom, of the 9th infantry. Recollect the same injury prevened General Pierce from partaking actively in the battle of of Churubusco. Recollect that his brigade, like Twiggs' division, was not prominently engaged in the battle of Molino. del Rey, although he with it was exposed to the heavy fire of the enemy. Recollect that General Pierce was, "in consequence of severe indisposition," confined to his bed during the storming of Chapultepec, and that during the 13th of September, while the only remaining regiment (the 9th) of his brigade was in the field, on the causeway of Belen, the same illness prevented him from being at its head, and it was not until 4 o'clock on the morning of the 14th of September that he rejoined that regiment at the gate of Belen, and that the city surrendered without another gun being fired by the American army. Thus much for four of the above Generals, whom the Herald says " fought and conquered hand to hand, while Gen. Scott sat safely at a distance, giving directions which those Generals counselled."-Baltimore American.
