

LATEST FROM EUROPE. By the arrival of the Herman and America, we have European dates up to the 12th. inst. The English Parliament opened in form by a speech from the Queen, in person, on the 11th. She declared friendly relations. with all foreign powers. Touching the fishing question, she said, that while the rights of her subjects shall be firmly maintained, the friendly spirit with which the question had been treated induced the hope that it would result in a beneficial extension and improvement of the common intercourse with the great American Republic. Her Majesty next congratulates the coun-

try on the prosperity which prevails, and hints at Protection vaguely as follows: " If you should be of the opinion that recent legislation, in contributing with other causes, to such a happy result, has at the same time afflicted unavoidable injustice on certain important interests, I recommend you dispassionately to consider how far it may be practicable equitably to mitigate the injury, and enable the industry of the country to meet successfully that unrestricted competition which Parliament decided it should be subjected to." Her Majesty also expressed the hope that these improvements be extended to Ireland, and recommends a generous policy toward that country.

Great anxiety was manifested throughout the country for the result of our Presidential Election. Pierce's success, it was thought, would give the last last blow to the Derby Government.

The returns of the Board of Trade for October furnish striking evidence of unprecedented activity in business. Compared with the same period last year, the exports exceed £1,035,000, diffused through every branch of industry. How could it be otherwise, when America alone continues to be such a capital market for British goods?

The most interesting, tho' perhaps, the least unexpected, piece of foreign news at this time, is the official announcement of the French Empire. The Senate so decreed it, submitting its final decision, however, to a vote of the people, on the 21st and 22d inst. The President sent in a message, officially signifying his acceptance of the Emperorship. The Empire is to be hereditary in Napoleon, whose title is to be Napoleon III. The succession is to be confined to the legitimate male issue of Napoleon; failing which, the Emperor may adopt an heir from the legitimate children and descendants of the Bonaparte family in the male line, no members of which are to marry without his consent. The Constitution of 1852 is to be maintained. So Napoleon, "the Little," has at last, reached the top of the ladder-so much the more disastrous his fall, when it does come. Four short years have wrought weathers in his fortune.
