It is removed that two or three Compnies have been chartered in the County during a former Session of the Legislature, at the instance of certain parties, some of whom in our midst were at the same time profes sing opposition to such enactments.

If this turn out to be true-and we shall make diligent inquiry about it-it should still more than ever rouse the opposition o "our people against the toleration of Mining corporations in our midst. If passed at all, it has been done in the most clandestine manner-without any intimation of the sort giv en to our cilizens and in the face of their well known opposition to such cuactments. The people should use every effort to have these charters revoked at the earliest possible day, and thus manifest their disapproval of this species of sucaking legislation, alike unworthy of and disgraceful to the authorities that sanction it, and the private individuals who take advantage of it. It, moreover teaches up that we are not safe, while a single Mining Corporation remains in the County, and the people should at once insist apon refusing the renewal of every such charter now existing, at its expiration.
