RAILROADS IN SCHUYLKILL CO. Through the kindness of a friend, we have received comes of the following Railroad Bills passed at the last session of our State Legislature, in which the citizens of this county are interested :

To Incorporate the Parther Creek and Lauret Run Rail Raad Company.

Section 1.—Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Sanniet Bradford, F. McDonald, Samuel H. Rothennell, Jacob Serril, Charles B. Pottinger, John P. Sanderson, George Payne and M. G. Heilner, or any three of them, be, and they are hereby appointed, Commissioners to open books for the purpose of tecaying, subscriptions to the capital stock of the Company hereinafter directed to be incorporated. Section 2.—That the capital stock of the said Company shall be three hundred thousand dollars, which said capital may at any time be increased, if required, to any sum not exceeding six hundred themsand dollars. Section 3.—That the Panther Greek and Laurel Run Railroad Company hereby directed to be in-corporated, shall be and hereby is invested with all the rights and powers necessary for the construc-tion of a Rail Road, and repairs of the same, from the inouth of Laurel Run, Schuylkill County, to connect with the Philadelphia and Reading Rail Road, with the right to make such lateral branches, each not exceeding six miles in length, as the exicach not exceeding six miles in length, as the exigencies of trade may from time to time require.
