A bill has been introduced into the Legislature which proposes nothing less than to over-turn, in favor of Romanism, the long established system of ecclesiastical tenures; place in the hands of the Roman Bishops all the millions of church property belonging to the various Catholic societies, placing it at once beyond all control by those societies, in charge of a trustee who is in no wise resconsible to them, but who holds his appointent from, and his allegiance to a foreign title and attributes of a Bishop, and demands of our Legislature to couple his spiritual iurisdiction with the ownership of all the tem-poralities, all the churches, the burial places, he school edifices, the asylums, and all the hospitals of all the Catholic societies of the State. She asks the Legislature to make her Bishop a close corporation, having per-petual succession, and through him to place at the will of the Roman pontiff, all the church property of the Catholic people of the country. That the great system which secures to each society or congregation the control of us own temporalities, which discourages the aggregation of a vast amount of church property in individual hands, shall be abandoned, and that the policy of the gov-erument in regard to ecclessiastical property, shall be so changed as to accommoda the despotic and anti-republican dogmas of Rome. Rome asks this upon the ground, that by what she pleases to term her church canons, all ecclesiastical property is required to be vested in the great head of the church. That by the determination of the secret council of the Vatican, the Catholic, societies, the various congregations, shall not be trusted with the title to the property which they purchase and pay for with their own money,

but that it must be vested in those who owe, superior and direct allegiance to the great This great, radical, and as it seems to us dangerous change of policy in regard to ecclesiastical tenures, is moving to a consummation without comment from scarcely a press in the State. This measure, which Romanism demands, is suffered to ripen to maturity, with scarce a comment from the public press. The Bishops and priests, obedient to the fiat at Rome, push it forward, demand it with voice potential, while the people remain uninformed on the subject, through the silence of the watchmen whose duty it is to sound the alarm, when danger approaches. Rome is reaching out to gather to herself influence through the control of these millions, to render the Catholic laity at once subservient, and to all save herself verlese to strangle our system of free education, and in this country, as in others, make human ignorance the great lever of her power, and scarcely a hand is raised to check her encroachments, or stay her usurp-ations. The reason of this supineness is to be lound in an apprehended political loss, which parties may sustain through the defection of Catholic voters. The Catholic vote has been so long one of the great slakes played for by the demagogues of party, that it has come to be a fixed axiom in politics, that nothing that he said or done with the said or done shall be said or done which may be displeasing to Romanism, and that it can have whatever it asks for, as a consideration for its aid It seems to us that it is time a stop was put to this catering and intriguing for the voles of any religious denomination. 

ACCIDENTS IN COAL MINES. A Parliamentary paper which has just been issued, contains returns from the Government Inspectors of Coal Mines, of the number of accidents which happened in these mines during the years 1851 and 1852. with other particulars relative to the causes which produced the accidents, and the resuits of the judicial investigations, &c. appears that four districts were marked out. with an Inspector appointed tor each; but saveral medifications having been introduced, and the limits of the districts altered, each Inspector has made a return of the dis-triet he has inspected, which has varied a: different times. From the report of Mr. DICKENSON, whose district comprised Statordshire, Lancashire, Worcestershire, Cheshire, Shropdshire and North Wales, and was 600, and the deaths arising

subsequently South Wales, Gloucestershire ersetshire, the number of accidents from was 757. From the report of Mr. Dayrs, Inspector of Coal Mines in Durham, Northumberland, Cumberland and Scotland, (up to the end of 1851.) the number of deaths from accidents in the mines was 470. In Scotland during 1852, the number of lives lost in coal pits was Gt : in iron-stone pits 18. From the report of Mr. Mack-worth, Inspector in Wales, it appears that the deaths in his district, the exact extent of which is not specified in the return, were 304. In the districts of Yorkshire and the idland Counties the number of deaths was 08; and in the Lancashire, Cheshire, &c., ing part of 1852, was 221. The total loss, therefore, caused by accidents in coal mines between November, 1850, and the 31st December, 1852, was 1,939 lives.
