These rumors are beginning to assume a tangible torm, and, therefore, justice to the community and to ourselves as impartial journalists, will not permit us to remain quiet any longer.

pied a desk in the scale office of the Mine Ilill and Schuylkill Haven Rail Road Company, for more coal than it was supposed at the scale office to ascertain the correctness of the weight, and the quantity entered on the ticket was found to be considerably greater than the actual weight entered on the books of the Company by the Collector who weighed the coal. This excited suspicion, and further investigations were privately made by the Collector on the West Branch Rail Road and an employee on the Reading Rail Road, which satisfied the parties that an extensive fraud had been practised in the filling up of the tickets from the weights of the scales. This information, we learn, was turnished to Mr. Tucker; and as soon as the President of the Mine Hill and Schuylkill Haven Rail Road Company was made acquainted with the facts, the Ticket Agent was promptly informed that he could no longer occupy a deak in the office of that Company. It is also rumored that since his dismissal he has acknowledged that the filling up of tickets with false weights commenced as early as 1850, after he entered the office as the Agent of the coal Operators; and rumor puts down the sum at various amounts, some as high as \$175,000, and others varying from \$130,000 to \$150,-000. It is also rumored that his confession implicates coal firms in this Region, as aiders and abettors; who have heretolore stood above suspicion in the community.


