THE BARDANELLES -The old gates of Janus were opened when Rome was at war; and their modern proto-types, the Dardanelles straits, are open only when a state of war makes treaty stipula-tions void, and the Porte deems it to be necessary to admit his allies through them to protect his capitol. The accounts we have are that they are now open for the passage of the British and French fleets. The Dardanelles, from which the strait, or Hellespont, derives its name, are four strong castles built opposite to each other on the Eu-

rupean and Asialic coasts; and the keys of Constantinople. Two of these eastles—the soon after the conquest of Constantinople, in 1453; the other two-the new castles-were built in the middle of the seventeenth centu ry to protect the Turks against the Venetians.
