The cholera, we observe, has been making sad ravages in New Orleans, principally however, among the Emigrant populationlast week out of 216 deaths in that city, 129 were from cholera. It has also been unusually virulent on ship-board-the Constellation arrived some days ago at New York, with a load of European emigrauts, of whom upwards of 100 out of 900 had died from cholera on the passage ; and the Marathon, also from Liverpool, arrived since, reports 64 deaths from the same fatal cause out of 522 passengers. The disease seems to be of an unusually fatal type, and generally carries off its

The subject is an unpleasant one to talk about ; but unpleasant topics must sometimes be treated; and the fact isthat the personal habits of these emigrants are filthy to a degree which few readers of these columns, who have not had an opportunity to study the natural history of the emigrant, can by the most active exertion of their imaginations possibly conceive. . They are content to live and move and have their being in such a concatenation of foul and pesplential substances which are anything but vapors, that the only wonder is that they are not rotten to the bone before they reach our shores. No domestic animal of decent antecedents would consent to live a half a day in the atmosphere and with the surroundings to which a large portion of these emigrants appear utierly indifferent. As to water, the lemales seem to conceive its only use to be to make tay," and the males to regard it as only fit to spoil whiskey. They turn into their quarters when they go on board and lie stewing and fretting in their filth, throughout the voyage, and leave their dens in such a condition that Hercules would have had but little choice between them and the Augean stables."
