GRAND JURY REPORT.

Liquor License in this County.

Last week, we directed attention in advance to the late Report of the Grand Jury, for this County. It will be found in full in today's paper.

The principal topic isn't the *law*, or the liquor laws, as regulated by existing laws; and some change or modification is earnestly recommended for the consideration of the Legislature of the State, so as to place all licenses for the County under the control of the Court. At present all Grocery establishments selling liquor, and all Porter shops receive licenses on payment of \$5, it is stated, which is about one-half the amount of a *Tavern* license. An application for a *Tavern* license, besides being signed by twelve reliable citizens, setting forth the necessity of such house, and certifying the good character and ability of the applicant to accommodate the public, it is also subject to the scrutiny of the Court; but over the other class of establishments referred to, and which are generally much lower in character and delinquency in influence than Taverns, the Court has no such authority, and the only remedy against them is prosecution at law for selling liquors not allowed or for being disorderly, which rends common practice proves to be wholly inefficient.

It is confidently hoped that the general expression of public opinion, at the late election in favor of a law, prohibiting entirely the traffic in intoxicating liquors, will be followed by the early action of the Legislature, to give us a safe and certain method of proceeding in such cases as to a state of lawlessness, as is now existing in this Commonwealth, at an early day. But if this is not done, we would respectfully call the attention of that body, in the urgent necessity for at least the legal provision on this subject required by the Grand Jury, for this County. Will our Senator and Representatives please make a note of it?

The proportion of criminal Justice in our Courts is estimated by the Jury to be quite *Teethless* in the whole number of cases tried. They, also, deduce from official statistics that there is *no license* liquor establishment in the entire County to every ELEVEN AND TWO-HUNDRED TAXABLE INHABITANTS in the Cal Region, one to every NINE AND A HALF!

This, it is remembered, is independent of the scores of unlicensed Ring holes, scattered over the County, particularly in the Coal Region, which sell day and night, Sundays as well as other days, without license or contrary to law.

Follow citizens and Tax-payers of Schuylkill, we put up no quinine plants and earnest, etc., we demand some reform in this subject!
