

With food in the soil, and rain to dissolve and prepare it to be taken up by the roots of it; corn plants, aided by cleanly and judicious culture, it never yet disapppointed the hupes of the planter, and never will; but it must be obvious to every reflecting mind, that a plant of such luxuriant growth, must liave all the necessary elements of vitality at command, or it will be despoiled of much of its fruitfulness. Now then, as it takes just as much labor, and costs just as much, to bultivate a crop of coru grown on a poor field, as it does on a fertile one and profit can only be assured by product-it is evident, that every one who attempts to grow a ctop! corn, should be sure that his land is righ in the elements of fertility, either naturally existing therein, or artificially applied : for, of a truth, it is but a waste of time and lather to attempt to make anything by cultivating corn on a poor suil.
