TERRIBLE WRECK. 180 PASSENGERS DROWNED. derival of the Atlantic Leverpool dates to 36. The War news grows more and more ineresting every arrival. We glean the following from the Atlantic's advices ; Odessa has been bomberded by a portion of the allied fleet. On the 23d., nine steamers took up a position before the forte that command the entrance to the harbor, and mmediately commenced to throw bombs and rockets upon the forts and the cny. The ac-Sounts are meagre and unsatisfactory—the damage done to the opposing parties being differently stated, according to the sources. The Russians have completely evacuated Little Weilschie. They were harrassed on their retreat by the Torks. This hes, of course, rendered necessary a change in the Turkish front, and makes it no longer requisite to maintain at Kala at the 50,000 men, and immense force of artillery hitherto mounted there. The whole army will now be immediately under the hand of Omer Pasha. The right wing of the Russians will now probably rest on the river Aluta, with its head quarters at Bucharest, and the main

interest of the campaign is once more con-centrated on the operations below Nicopolis, and especially between Rustchuck and Sil-This last mentioned place is strongly fortified, and cannot be carried without a severa and perhaps prolonged struggle. Accounts from Bucharest, April 19th, mention that it Silistria) had been hard pressed aince the 4th, and would ere then have fallen but for determined valor of its defenders, who express themselves able to hold out until aid shall arrive. The Russians, on the contrary, expect to reduce the place in a lew days. Mustapha Pacha has a strong garrison, but is said to be neither well richaled, nor properly supplied with ammunition. The fort is in the possession of the Russians, as are also the entrenchments at the junction of the Dristra, the Turks having retired within the defences. The Russians were expected to assault, on the 1st May with 30,000 men. They have erected seventeen heavy batteries under cover of which they will cross the river. The passage at Oltentiza is expected at the same time.

Osman Pasha, the Turkish Gyoernor of Matschip, has been arrested and is to be tried by a council of war, on a charge of treason.

Osman was arrested by order of Omar Pasha, on the charge of cowardice on face of the enemy, and treasonable connivance with the enemy's plans.

The British fleet in the Bastic had been forther remorred, and was awaiting the arrival of the French squadron. Until the latter arrives, a British force will cruise off the Gulfe of Finland and Bothnia.
